

### **EXISTING PARKS POLICIES**

### **Siting and Acquisition**

Identify lands with highquality natural resources that are desirable for Regional Parks System activities and put these lands in a protected status, so they will be available for recreational uses and conservation purposes in perpetuity.

### **Planning**

Promote master planning and help provide integrated resource planning across jurisdictions.

### **System Protection**

Protect public investment in acquisition and development by assuring that every component in the system is able to fully carry out its designated role as long as a need for it can be demonstrated.

### **Recreation Activities** and Facilities

Provide a regional system of recreation opportunities for all residents and visitors while conserving the integrity of the natural resource base within the Regional Parks System on which these opportunities depend.

#### **Finance**

Provide adequate and equitable funding for the Regional Parks System units and facilities in a manner that provides the greatest possible benefits to the people of the region.

# Metropolitan Parks and Open Space Commission Advice

### Feb. 1, 2024

- Address water quality and availability.
- Rethink regional trails as more than just a place to bike.
- Joint promotion of regional park and trail opportunities could unlock economic benefits for local communities.
- Climate and natural systems content seems to be elevated. That is important.

### March 7, 2024

- Consider including quantitative goals for number of trails developed, acres protected, etc.
- Safety is critical. Let's be sure this is addressed appropriately.
- Really like proposal to move procedural items to a handbook.
- Imagine 2050 should be visionary and aspirational.
- Looking out to 2050, water may be a real limiting factor.
- Consider an executive summary.
- Propose approving handbook first, before Imagine 2050.



# Implementing Agency Partner Advice



### Jan. 18, 2024

- Strengthen tribal relationships,
   co-management of parks and trails.
- New cultural landscape classification idea
- New natural system/openspace classification idea
- Create multi-jurisdictional
   Climate Action Plans
- Expand allowable activities and facilities in regional parks and trails to meet emerging needs


### Feb.15, 2024

- Co-management is too specific an action at system level. Consider indigenous reconciliation.
- Like new classification ideas. Consider using existing classifications.
   Define cultural landscapes.
- Council should be a convenor, not imposer.
- Don't diminish regional status by adding more local amenities.

## Committee of the Whole Advice

### February 21, 2024

- Agree with shifting siting and acquisition to an action.
- Appreciate emerging policy space for cultural landscapes.
- Protect and provide access to natural areas in suburban and rural contexts too. Restoration of industrial landscapes is too narrow a focus.
- How do we assess access and availability of regional parks throughout the metropolitan area?
- Appreciate the "take care of what we have" objective. This is critical.
- Appreciate reframing of policy to <u>equitable</u> recreation activities and facilities.
- Appreciate the existing policy plan's orientation to community engagement. This is meaningful.






