What's New? Draft Regional Parks Policy Plan Update





Six Most Significant Things about the Update

- 1. Affirm direction created in 2015 with 2040 Regional Parks Policy Plan
- 2. Continue to use Equity Toolkit to examine equity impact:
 - For review with Bonding and Legacy projects
 - Modify to be used in park and trail master planning
 - No more project prioritization
- 3. Update System Plan one new regional park and 11 new regional trails!
- 4. Consolidate current Regional Parks System additions criteria into one table to set up a productive 2019 system addition discussion
- 5. Commit to creating the Equity Grant Program by 2019
- 6. Develop the Grant Program Guide, splitting out the administrative and grant program information from the policy plan



Chapters 1 and 2: Introduction and Overview

- No significant changes
- Updated Regional Parks System facts, figures, and maps
- In Chapter 2, added Interest Earnings on Park Funds citation to Key Legislation Section
 - Options for using interest earnings will be determined by the Council in coordination with others, outside of the policy plan update

Chapter 4: Siting and Acquisition

- Added "Process and Criteria Overview for System Additions" section. **Consolidated existing criteria**
- Strategy 1: Lands with restoration potential are also eligible
- Strategy 2: Geographic balance concept as stand-alone strategy
- Strategy 4: New regional trails may connect state and/or federal recreation units and regionally significant natural resources.
- Strategy 5: Expanded Bridging facilities description as Special Recreation Feature





Chapter 5: Planning

- Strategy 1: Expanded to include:
 - Where appropriate, Council staff will provide assistance on master planning, including data/information about race, ethnicity, ability and income
 - New Legislative requirement for regional parks, park reserves, special recreation features, and trails located within the Mississippi River Corridor Critical Area





Chapter 6: System Protection

- funding, but it is not guaranteed.

• Strategy 4: Phase 1 and 2 Environmental Site Assessments are eligible for

 Strategy 6: Updated to reflect statutory authority and practice around locating regional wastewater infrastructure and fairly compensating park agencies





Chapter 7: Recreation Activities and Facilities

- Strategy 1: Balance conservation with the provision of recreation opportunities: Activities and facilities should avoid or minimize adverse environmental effects - Activities and facilities should evolve to meet all residents' needs, across race, ethnicity,

 - income and ability
- Strategy 2: Clarify range of recreation opportunities spectrum: developed to rustic
- Strategy 3: Reaffirm 2015 equity strategies, including Equity Grant Program by 2019
- Strategy 4: Better coordinate Council's implementation of Regional Trails and the Regional Bicycle Transportation Network



Equity strategies status - Planning

- Bridging facilities
 - Added additional language; interest rising; convening topic
- Encourage design elements in master plans, emphasizing new users
 - Amenities suited for aging and limited mobility population, picnic areas, large open ball fields suitable for emerging recreational patterns of use, amenities clusters serving multigenerational groups
- Continues; added examples based on community engagement; convening topic Require enhanced community engagement in developing regional park and trail master plans
 - To mitigate existing racial, ethnic, cultural, or linguistic barriers and include diverse races, ethnicities, classes, ages, abilities, and immigrant statuses
 - Continues; convening topic



Equity strategies status – Funding/investment

- Require equity toolkit in grant applications Continues; additional uses cited
- Using the toolkit, the Council and MPOSC will be involved in the prioritization of the project lists proposed for the CIP and the Parks and Trails Legacy Fund – Disallowed in 2017 funding bill; changed to analysis tool
 - program for capital projects explicitly aimed to strengthen equitable usage
- Using Council bonds, create, fund, and administer a set-aside competitive grant
 - Create by end of 2019; interest is high; potential use for interest earnings
- Require a minimum percentage of each agency's share of its Parks and Trails Legacy Fund appropriations be used to "Connect People and the Outdoors" Disallowed in 2017 funding bill; removed



Equity strategies status – Convene/information

- Create regional parks system ambassador program Created and staffed; continues with new hire in June 2018
- Assist implementing agencies in establishing public engagement process
- Available; broadened to peer sharing; convening topic
- Conduct studies to inform Regional Parks System planning and management - Continues; shared interest in quality studies; engaging research unit
- Convene stakeholder meetings with implementing agencies, partners, community based organizations and advocacy groups to enhance knowledge and continuous improvement
 - Strong support; will continue; venue for complex topics
- Conduct region-wide visitor survey every five years
 - Will continue; high interest in good data







Chapter 8: Finance

- Consolidate financial information into one standalone chapter
- Strategy 2: Bond funds may be used for natural resource restoration. Update **Council's Five-Year Parks Capital Improvement Plan**
- Strategy 3: Removed requirement to establish minimum level of spending for "connecting people and the outdoors"
- Strategy 4: Removed project prioritization from Legacy and Capital Improvement programs and recommitted to using Equity Toolkit
- Strategy 9: Explore other Regional Parks System funding sources. Includes estimate of costs to complete the system: \$2.6 billion!
