 Coordinate approach across jurisdictions; don't just add a layer of bureaucracy

Unique /Innovative Approaches Suggested	
• Enforce existing rules	
 There should be a unified effort to oversee water supply in the region 	
• Emphasize getting collaborative input from communities and a variety of stakeholders	
 Don't just focus on citizens reducing per capita use, also look at governments' water use; "governments water their parks." 	
 Changes to current practices, such as water use and water pricing suggestions, using beet j instead of salt in winter, and sweeping streets every week near lakefronts 	uice
