Proposed Action

None at this time. Staff are presenting this as an information item for discussion purposes. The intent is to provide the Committee with both the context and the forum to confirm that the criteria and approach for the program, as adopted in 2015, are in keeping with statutory guidance as well as the spirit and purpose of this regional grant program.

The question for discussion is how to distribute the additional \$500,000 the Council added to the Planning Assistance Grant Program as part of its 2016 budget action. A proposed action for the Committee's consideration will be presented at the next scheduled meeting on April 18, 2016.

Background

To support local governments updating their decennial local comprehensive plans, the Council provides five types of assistance:

- 1. Direct staff assistance through the Sector Representative Program
- 2. Guidance, tools, and resources through the Local Planning Handbook
- 3. Mapping assistance through the Mapping Services Program and the online Mapping Tool
- 4. Comprehensive planning training through the PlanIt Training workshop series
- 5. Financial resources through the Planning Assistance Grant Program

Minnesota Statutes Section 473.867, subd. 2 authorizes the Metropolitan Council to establish a planning assistance fund to provide grants and loans to local units of government for the primary purpose of reviewing and amending local comprehensive plans, fiscal devices, and official controls, as required by the Metropolitan Land Planning Act. The Council has provided grant funding in previous decennial review rounds to identified eligible communities to update local comprehensive plans.

Minn. Stat. 473.867, subd. 3 directs the Council to base its decision on making grants and loans on the recipient's demonstrated need and available financial resources. In addition, because of limited funds available for the Planning Assistance Grant Program, the Council establishes eligibility to apply for and receive planning grants. Specifically, the Council identifies eligibility criteria to target communities most in need of financial assistance to complete their local plans.



Adopted Eligibility Criteria

In March 2015, the Council adopted the following eligibility criteria for individual communities:

- Total Net Tax Capacity (NTC) per capita amount less than or equal to the regional median NTC per capita; AND
- Percent forecasted growth from 2010 to 2040 is greater than or equal to the regional median percent forecasted growth

The Council also included a criterion for a group of communities:

• Be a county or a consortium of at least 5 communities working collaboratively to update their local comprehensive plans

Later that year, as part of the Council's 2016 budget discussions at Management Committee and Council meetings, the Council made an additional \$500,000 available for the Planning Assistance Grant Program, changing the fund budget from \$1.4 million to \$1.9 million. The Council did not include additional direction on how those funds should be distributed as part of that action. The Council approved the additional funds as part of the 2016 Unified Budget on December 9, 2015.

To assure that the criteria are reflective of current conditions, Council staff have applied the adopted criteria using 2015 Net Tax Capacity data and the Council's 2015 population forecasts as adopted with the September 2015 issuance of System Statements. Table 1 shows the differences in criteria with these updated data.

- The program updated with 2015 tax data and system statement forecasts, and the increased budget amount.

Further Program Background

In April 2014, the Community Development Committee affirmed the provision of planning grants for communities to update their 2040 local comprehensive plans. The CDC also directed staff to work through the Land Use Advisory Committee to assess the funding need and to develop eligibility criteria.

Over several meetings beginning in July 2014, the Land Use Advisory Committee discussed the Planning Assistance Grant Program, potential eligibility criteria, and potential grant award amounts. Program Options discussed by the committee appear in Table 3 (Options 1, 2, and 3). All three options considered included a criterion for counties or collaborations of 5 or more communities. Based on past grant cycles, the county/collaborative groups represent 32 townships.

Table 4 shows the impact of options on the number of eligible communities, potential grant award amounts, and total program cost for each of the proposed options. All of the options fell within the original \$1.4 million program budget without any proposed increases.

After much debate, the Land Use Advisory Committee forwarded a recommendation to the Community Development Committee to adopt the eligibility criteria in Options 1 and 3. Table 5 describes the program summary for the LUAC recommendation and the 2007 Planning Grant Program for comparison purposes.

In March 2015, the Community Development Committee considered the recommendation from the Land Use Advisory Committee and decided to recommend that the Council adopt the criteria of Option 2. At the March meeting of the Metropolitan Council, the Council directed staff to implement with Planning Assistance Grant Program with the criteria from Option 2.

Council staff are aware of substantial support from communities regarding the Planning Assistance Grant Program. Staff regularly receive phone calls and email correspondence inquiring about the availability of the program and the potential award amounts. In addition, some ineligible communities have expressed concern regarding their ability to complete their plan update without financial assistance.
