Update on the use of the **Council's Fair Housing Resources in 2017**

\$70,000 for Fair Housing Activities carried over from 2016

- \$9,500 to support continued training and technical assistance for the Mixed-Income Housing Calculator
- \$35,000 for the development of a model fair housing policy for adoption by local governments
- Testing on landlord acceptance of Housing Choice Vouchers was not able to be done in 2017, leaving \$25,500 in unallocated carry-over
- \$125,500 was therefore available in 2017



\$125,500 for Fair Housing Activities in 2017 Budget (1 of 3)

\$10,000 to the Fair Housing Implementation Council

- Supports regional collaboration on fair housing
- Supports the Thrive strategy of "engaging a full cross-section" of the community in decision-making"
- Builds on \$17,500 in investments made in 2015 and 2016



\$125,500 for Fair Housing Activities in 2017 Budget (2 of 3)

- \$75,000 to HousingLink's Housing Hub:

 - Centralizes the region's project-based Section 8 waiting lists An online tool that allows all of the properties with projectbased Section 8 units to be part of one website
 - Benefits low-income renters and property managers of affordable properties
 - Other funders include philanthropic and government sources



\$125,500 for Fair Housing Activities in 2017 Budget (3 of 3) • \$37,500 to support HOME Line's tenant advocacy

- hotline:
 - Provides legal advice to solve rental problems, preventing over 555 evictions in 2017 in the 7-county metro and helping renters save an estimated \$944,947
 - More than half the residents served call from suburban communities
 - The vast majority of callers are at or below HUD's definition of low-income and 44% of callers identify as people of color
