## **Proposed Action**

### Background

The Council is required by Minnesota Statute 473.147 to prepare and adopt a long-range system policy plan for regional recreation open space, that is the *Regional Parks Policy Plan*, as part of the Council's metropolitan development guide. The Council has consulted with the Metropolitan Parks and Open Space Commission (MPOSC), regional park implementing agencies, other partners and stakeholders, and the residents of the region as part of the development of the draft 2018 update to the *2040 Regional Parks Policy Plan*. This plan builds on the policy direction established in the most recent policy plan update adopted in early 2015, as well as direction provided in *Thrive MSP 2040*.

The draft plan was released for public comment on July 25, 2018. The public record will remain open until 5:00 p.m. on Thursday, September 27, 2018. The draft of the 2018 update to the *2040 Regional Parks Policy Plan* is available for review on the Council's website at:

#### Rationale

The public hearing will offer partners, stakeholders, and the public an opportunity to formally comment in person on the draft *2040 Regional Parks Policy Plan*.
