Regional Snapshot



Economic Conditions

• 2020

- Over 40% MN households experience earning loss in 2020*. Losses were higher in households of color (52%).
- 3.5% State GDP loss is similar to national average.
- Twin Cities metro area fully recovered its high-wage employment level in 4th quarter 2020.
 Low-wage employment remained 38% below pre-pandemic levels at the end of the year.

• 2021

- Only 57% of jobs lost to recession have been recovered.
- For state fiscal year 2021, year-to-date receipts are now \$23.113 billion, \$2.170 billion (10.4 percent) more than projected.




Housing

- 2019 and 2020 housing production numbers were the first and second highest annual totals in the past decade.
- Apartment building boom has bolstered supply, leading to stabilized rent levels.







METRO HRA

Metro HRA conducts inspections to ensure that assisted units meet federal Housing Quality Standards (HQS) and are "decent, safe and sanitary".

The HQS specify that each unit meet basic performance requirements relating to:

FAIR HOUSING

The federal Fair Housing Act makes it illegal to consider race, color, religion, national origin, sex, disability, or family status in rental, sales, or lending decisions.

The Minnesota Human Rights Law also makes it illegal to discriminate based on creed, sexual or affectional orientation, marital status or receipt of public assistance.





GRANTS HELP GROW METRO PARKS AND TRAILS

Date: Thursday, August 13, 2020

The Metropolitan Council has awarded nearly \$900,000 to Washington and Ramsey counties and the Three Rivers Park District to buy property for regional parks and open space.

Council officials say the investment reflects the region's commitment to grow the region's network of parks and trails, preserve natural resources, and encourage the use of regional parks among all residents.





COUNCIL RELEASES GREENHOUSE GAS EMISSIONS TOOL

Date: Wednesday, April 22, 2020

The Metropolitan Council is developing two online tools to help local governments quantify their greenhouse gas emissions and choose strategies to reduce those emissions.

The first is a greenhouse gas inventory, which will provide local governments with high-quality data about greenhouse gas emissions from several key sectors. In celebration of Earth Day, the Council released an early version of the inventory,

version of the inventory, which includes transportation and energy emissions data for cities and townships in the seven-





Climate change is occurring all around the world, including right here in the Twin Cities metropolitan region. Winnesota has already experienced more extreme rainfal and warmer winters due to climate change, and additional changes are on the way. The good news is that many solutions that help solve the climate problem are actions we can take right here in our communities.

Community Overview

The estimated population of Forest Lake as of April 1, 2016, is 20,497. Forest Lake is designated a Emerging Suburban Edge community in Thrive MSP 2040, the Met Council's recional development framework.

NEW REGIONAL DATASET HAS EQUITY FOCUS

Date: Thursday, May 20, 2021

The Met Council has released an updated and expanded **Equity Considerations dataset** that provides equity-relevant
characteristics for each of the 704 census tracts in the Twin
Cities region.

The dataset contains disaggregated data (broken down by detailed subcategories) on a full range of topics that would otherwise be difficult to access in one place. Broad topic areas include demographics, migration, historic discrimination, housing, environment and climate, amenities, and many more. The dataset includes 300 distinct data fields.



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COVID-19 ECONOMIC IMPACTS IN THE TWIN CITIES

How the pandemic is affecting the region's workers and households

In recent months, business, households, and governments have rapidly curtailed economic activities, in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. Data from surveys and unemployment insurance claims paint a picture of economic collapse: nearly 50 million people have filed for unemployment benefits since March, including 495,000 in the Twin Cities region (March through June).

Initial findings include:

- · Poverty rate changes and housing cost burden changes will depend on the duration of business closures and reduced economic activity.
- People of color have experienced a disproportionately large share of job losses since the beginning of the pandemic. The benefits provided by the federal
 relief package will temporarily reduce disparities by race and ethnicity, though disparities will remain quite large.
- Relief from the federal relief package (the CARES Act) mostly mitigate earnings losses, provided that industries re-open and deferred economic activities resume in mid-2020.

To put the economic dynamic in context, and to promote understanding of the social and economic impacts, the Community Development research team is analyzing the likely effects of the employment and income losses. Key measures include unemployment, poverty, and housing cost burden rates, as well as disparities by race and ethnicity in these measures. Staff will continue updating this analysis as new questions and data sources emerge in the coming weeks and months.



Visualizing Regional Inequities—Interactive

Explore three decades of metro-level quality of life indicators disaggregated by race and ethnicity in the Visualizing Regional Inequities interactive.

The 16-county Twin Cities metro area continues to rank highly among other U.S. metros for our impressive economic performance and relative housing affordability. However, underlying these high-level measures reveals that not all residents experience the overall successes of our metro area. Disparities in employment, poverty, income, and homeownership by race and ethnicity persist in the Twin Cities and—in some cases—are the largest nationwide.






2022 Proposed Budget - \$131.2M
