## Climate Pollution Reduction Grant


## The EPA is funding climate change solutions

Grants are awarded in two phases:

- Phase 1: \$250 million noncompetitive planning grants
- Phase 2: \$4.3 billion competitive implementation grants

July 2023: Council was awarded a \$1 million planning grant.

Phase 2 Implementation Grants are now available

## Climate Pollution Reduction Grants

### **Phase 1 Planning**

### PCAP – Due March 1, 2024

- Preliminary Greenhouse Gas (GHG) Emissions Inventory
- GHG Reduction Measures
- LIDAC Analysis
- Authority to implement

#### CCAP – Due Summer/Fall 2025

- Complete and updated GHG emission inventories
- GHG emission projections
- Identify near and long term GHG emissions

### **Phase 2 Implementation**

Implementation Grants- Due April 1, 2024

~\$4.3 billion in competitive grant money

#### Eligible entities:

- Lead CPRG organizations
- Executive branch-level agencies/departments
- Municipalities
- Tribes and tribal consortia
- Coalitions of above groups

Implementation grants MUST reference GHG reduction measures in PCAP

## Climate Pollution Reduction Grant, Phase 2



### **Objectives of the Grant**

- Implement ambitious measures that will achieve significant cumulative greenhouse gas reductions by 2030 and beyond
- Achieve substantial community benefits, particularly in low-income and disadvantaged communities (LIDACs)
- Complement other funding sources to maximize these GHG reductions and community benefits
- Pursue innovative policies and programs that are replicable and be "scaled up" across jurisdictions

## **Phase 2 Funding Tiers**

| Tier   | Grant Ranges<br>(million) | Funds Targeted for Each Tier (billion) | Anticipated Number of Grants to be Awarded |
|--------|---------------------------|--|--|
| Tier A | \$200 to \$500            | \$2.0                                  | 4-10                                       |
| Tier B | \$100 to <\$200           | \$1.3                                  | 6-13                                       |
| Tier C | \$50 to <\$100            | \$0.6                                  | 6-12                                       |
| Tier D | \$10 to <\$50             | \$0.3                                  | 6-30                                       |
| Tier E | \$2 to <\$10              | \$0.1                                  | 10-50                                      |
|        | Totals                    | \$4.3 billion                          | 30-115                                     |





### **Equitable Residential Decarbonization**

- Expanding Energy Navigator program to serve communities statewide
- Expanding existing decarbonization programs with a first cohort of local governments
- Organizing a coalition of Tribal governments to advance residential decarbonization
- Second local and tribal government cohort starting in year two of the grant proposal
- Grant program for private property residential decarbonization program for communities in the 7-county metro area.
- Targeted workforce development to support the decarbonization efforts and to hit the project goals for greatest emissions impact.

### LIDACs bear a disproportionate burden of climate pollution









## **Competitive Grants & Technical Assistance**

- \$30 million total, ~\$28M for private property grants
- Grants to local governments to be made available to private property owners for residential decarbonization work
  - Annual program over 3 years, about \$9.4M/year
  - 1-4 unit sized buildings
  - Eligible activities include weatherization and space heating electrification
  - 1 FTE for Grants Administration, 1 1-year FTE to support program development
- Technical assistance team 2 FTEs
  - Application development process
  - Support implementation private property owners
  - Overall program assistance, partnering with local governments in reaching eligible property owners

## **Grant priorities**

Residences located in lowincome and disadvantaged communities

Residences outside of lowincome and disadvantaged communities for households falling below the low-income threshold

- Submit Letter of Intent
- Grant application due to EPA
- Memorandum of Agreement due
- EPA to announce selected projects and awards
- If awarded, performance period begins



## **Proposed Actions**

That the Metropolitan Council authorize the Executive Director of the Community Development Division to:

- 1. Develop grant application and related materials as a partner agency with the State of Minnesota as the lead agency for the Equitable Residential Decarbonization project to be submitted for Phase 2 Implementation Grants of the Environmental Protection Agency's Climate Pollution Reduction Grants Program.
- 2. Develop and submit a Letter of Intent to participate in the proposal as a part of the application process.
- 3. Negotiate and execute the memorandum of agreement with the State of Minnesota for participation in the coalition grant.
- 4. Negotiate and execute the any required agreements with the Environmental Protection Agency.



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
