### **Background**

Staff will hold three public meetings for customers regarding the preliminary proposed 2017 rates and charges (Attachment A) and other strategic matters (Attachment B – meeting brochure). This information item is to brief Committee members on the rates we will discuss. Customers want to know MCES rates as soon as possible. Municipalities want to know for their rate setting and total cost-of-government computation. Businesses want to know so they are aware of the cost of the service in order to set their pricing for 2017.

# **PERFORMANCE**

#### PERMIT COMPLIANCE, AWARDS

In 2015, MCES treatment plants continued to perform at a high level in complying with clean water discharge permits. System-wide, wastewater was treated to 100% NPDES compliance and all air emissions permits and stack tests were successfully passed. The interceptor system had no Notices of Violations.

Six MCES treatment plants earned NACWA's Platinum Award for five or more consecutive years of perfect permit compliance through 2014 and awarded in 2015: Hastings (24 years), St. Croix Valley (23), Seneca (14), Blue Lake (9), Eagles Point (9) and Empire (7).

Additionally, all of the discharging MCES treatment plants received 2015 Certificates of Commendation for Operational Excellence from the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency.

# **INVESTMENTS**

#### ASSET PROTECTION

The estimated replacement value of the regional wastewater system is nearly \$7 billion. The MCES capital investment program invests approximately \$140 million annually (2%), including \$135 million annually for asset preservation.

The largest investment, about \$100 million annually, is being spent on rehabilitation/ replacement of pipelines that are in poor condition, primarily due to hydrogen sulfide corrosion of concrete and metal pipes, as well as rehabilitation/replacement of aging pump stations and meter stations. Wastewater treatment plant investments are also focused on asset preservation, as well as energy conservation and recovery.

#### SOLAR

MCES is advancing solar projects that provide environmental, societal, and financial benefits (to our ratepayers) - equivalent to electricity from all MCES facilities at an amount close to 10%.

The Blue Lake Plant solar panel installation (front cover) is connected to the facility and generates electricity equivalent to 10% of the plant's demand. Plans are under way to construct a 3MW (megawatt) community solar garden at Blue Lake, and 5 MW at the Empire plant this summer. And more is coming (3MW is equal to the electricity usage in about 500 households).
