2019 Rate Setting Schedule

Customer Workshops & Open Houses



- Open House format with 12 stations featuring Environmental Services departments
- Preliminary Municipal Wastewater Charges (MWCs) sent mid-May to each of our 109 communities
- 40 attendees from 33 communities

2019 Executive Summary

- Proposed Sources & Rates
 - Regional wastewater charge: 3.5%
 - Sewer Availability Charge: No Increase
 - \$2,485 per SAC Unit – same since 2014
 - Industrial Strength Charge: 3.4%
 - Industrial Permit Fee: 3.5%
- Proposed Uses
 - 6.0% increase over 2018
 - 4.7% increase excluding pass-through grants



Changes from May 8 Information Item*

2018:

- Increased expense budget by \$4.7 million for approved carryforward items.

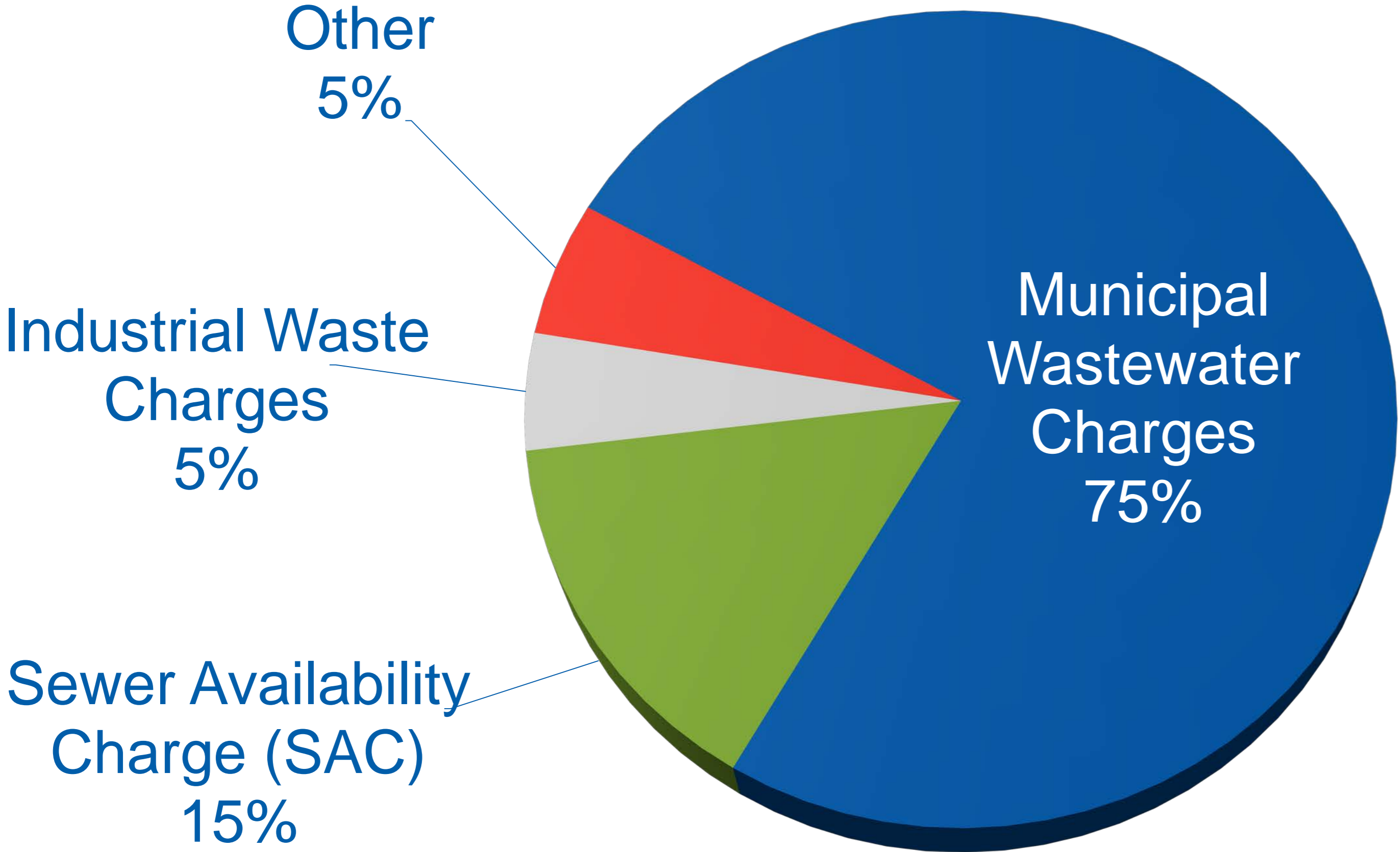
2019:

- Increased expense and revenue budget by \$5 million for pass-through Inflow and Infiltration Grants.
- Decreased interdivisional charges by \$.3 million, per RA.

**Changes will not impact MCES rates.*

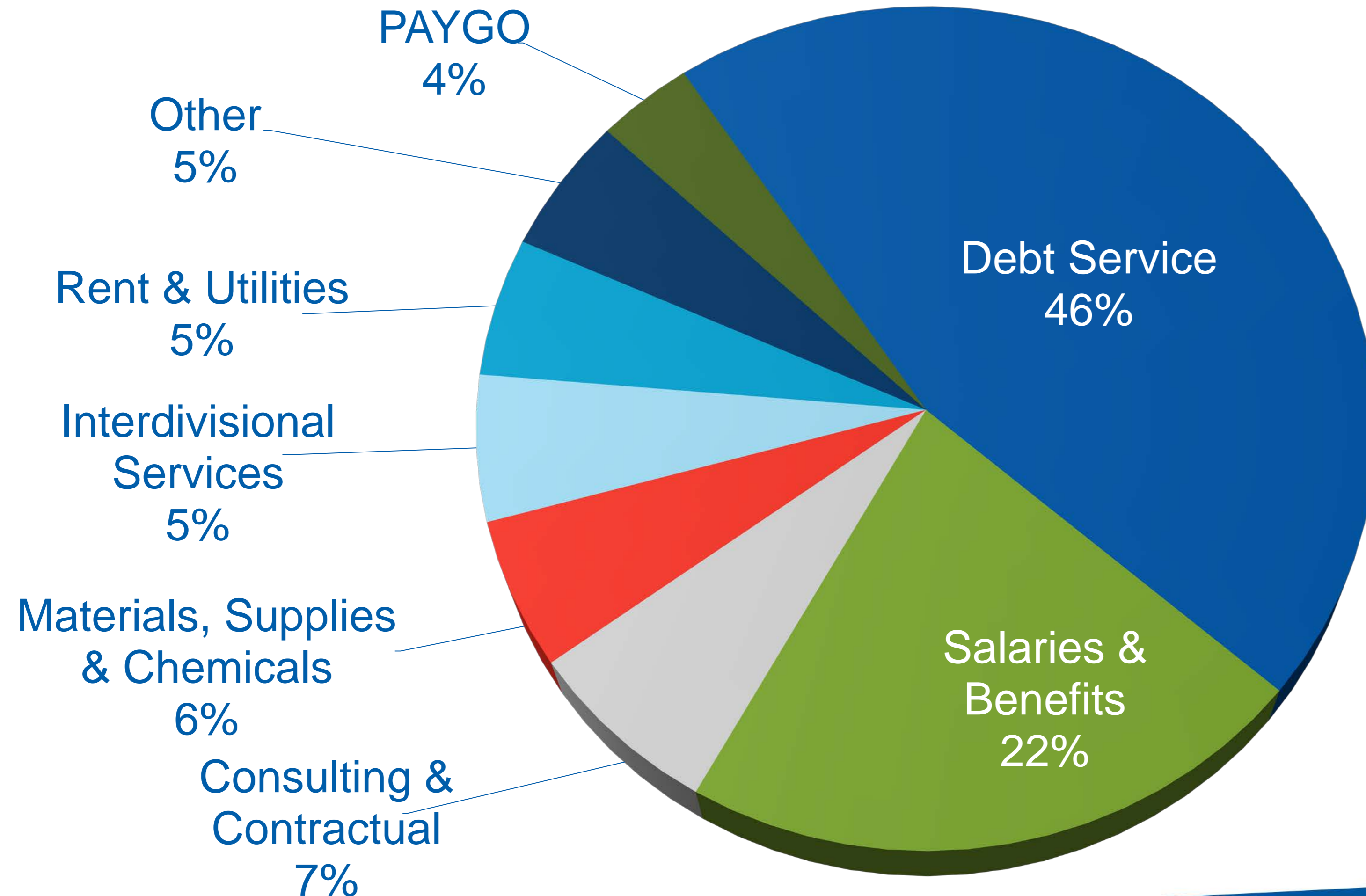

*Other includes state appropriations, OPEB adjustment, and \$3 million use of Reserves

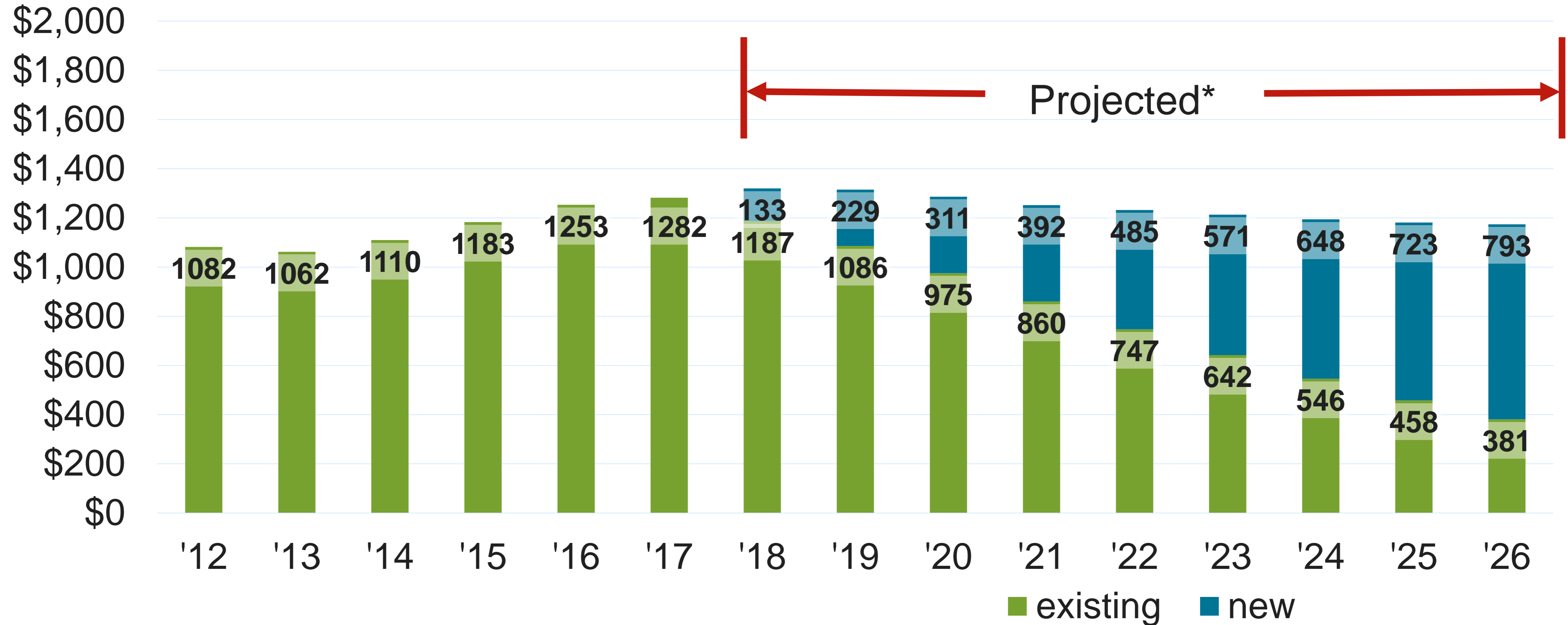
Proposed 2019 Uses by Category: \$305 million

(\$ in millions)

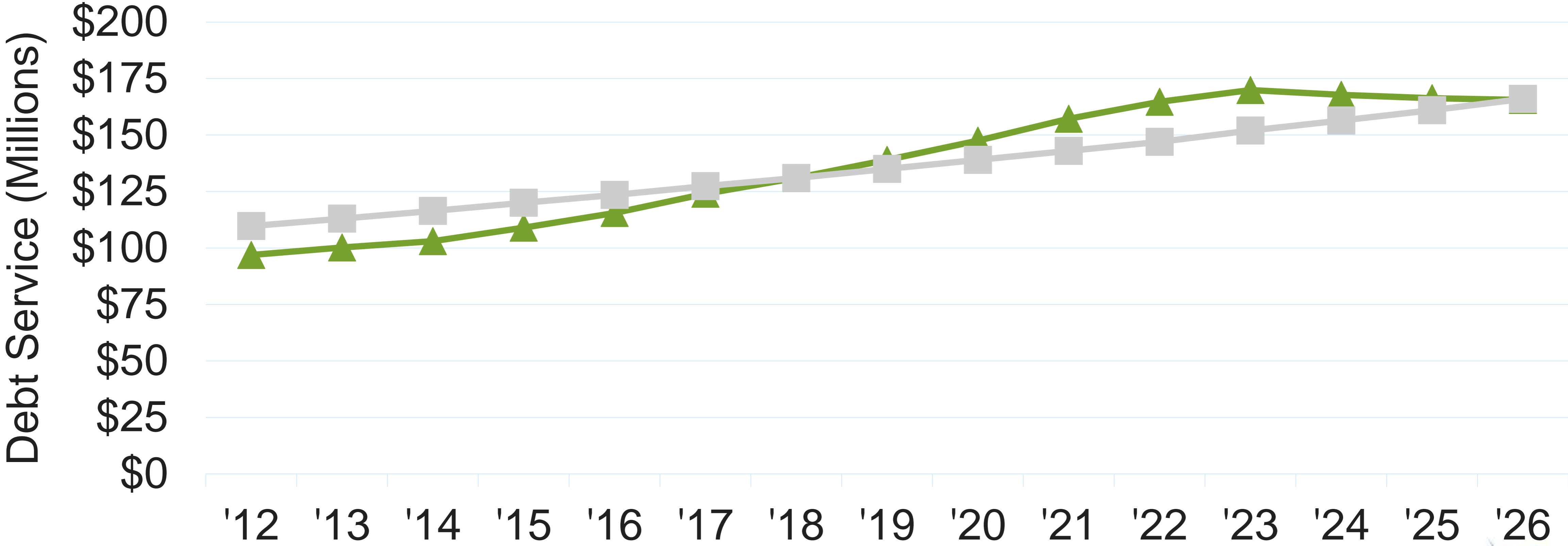

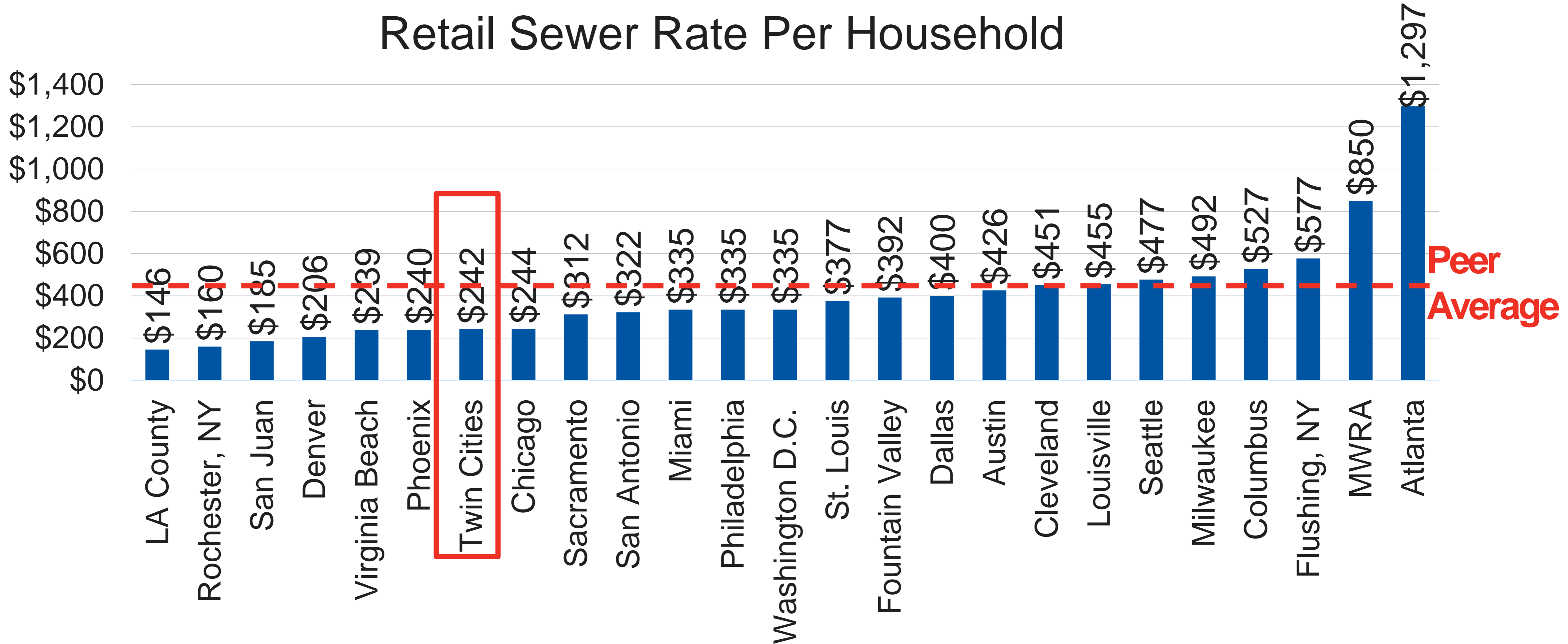
▲ 2012-2018 Actual Debt Service, projected thereafter

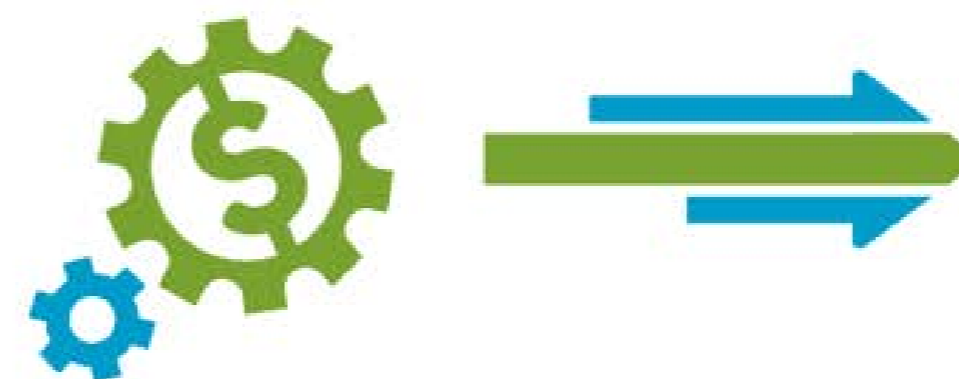
Proposed Changes to Industrial SAC

- Industrial Capacity Charge (ICC) provides industries an option to pay for Industrial Process SAC on an as-needed basis
 - Can still purchase SAC up-front, increasing baseline, reported through the cities
 - ICC does not change baseline
 - ICC in 2019 is \$2.10 per 1,000 gallons of flow that exceeds baseline
 - Does not impact commercial (i.e., building) SAC
- ICC would be paid ***directly*** to MCES
- Activity would still be reported to cities
- **Outreach coming as collaboration is needed to work with communities that charge local SAC and WAC**



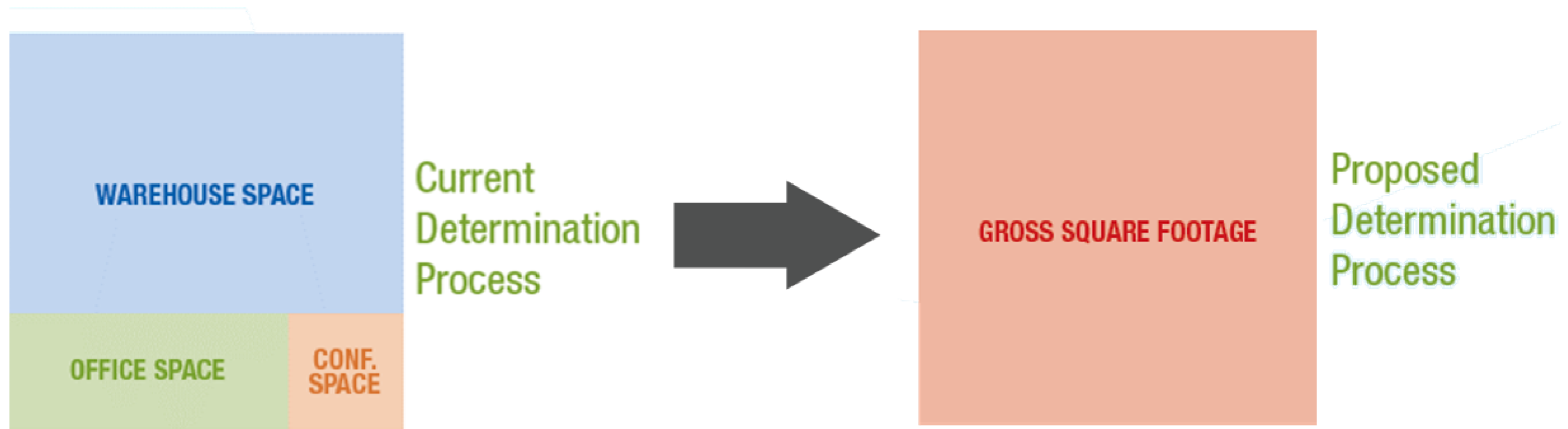
Up-front Industrial Charge

or

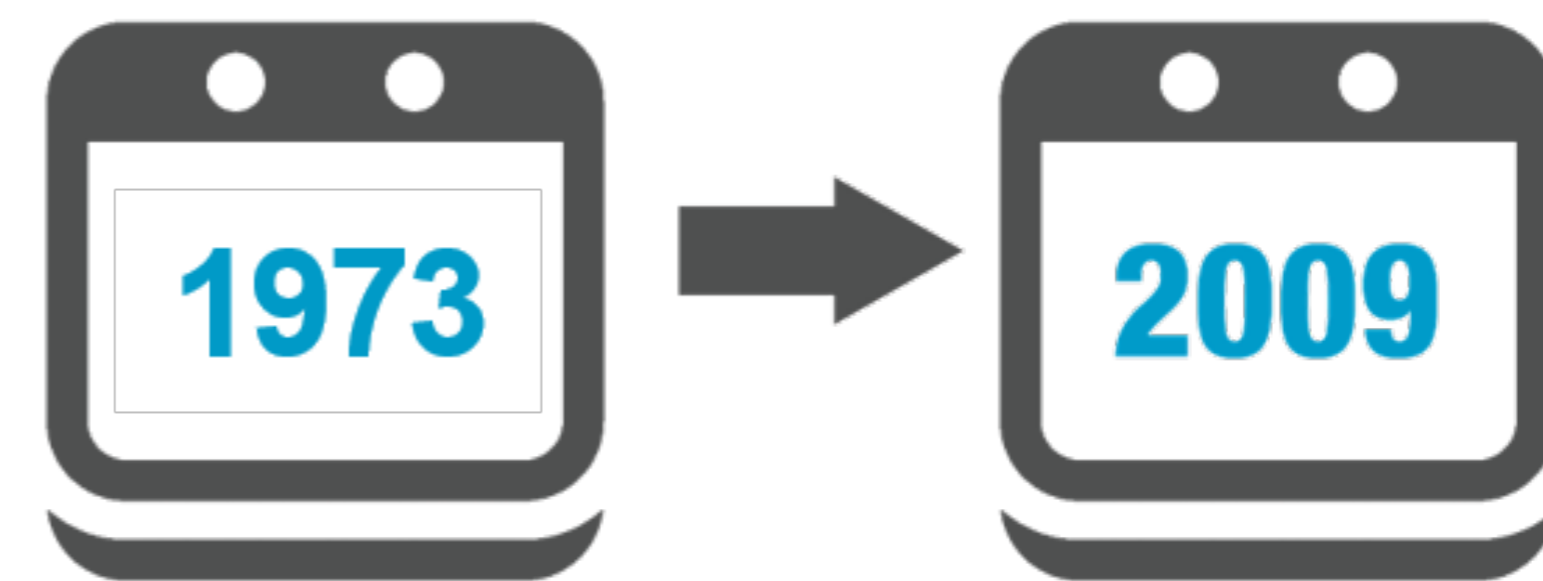


Ongoing Charge

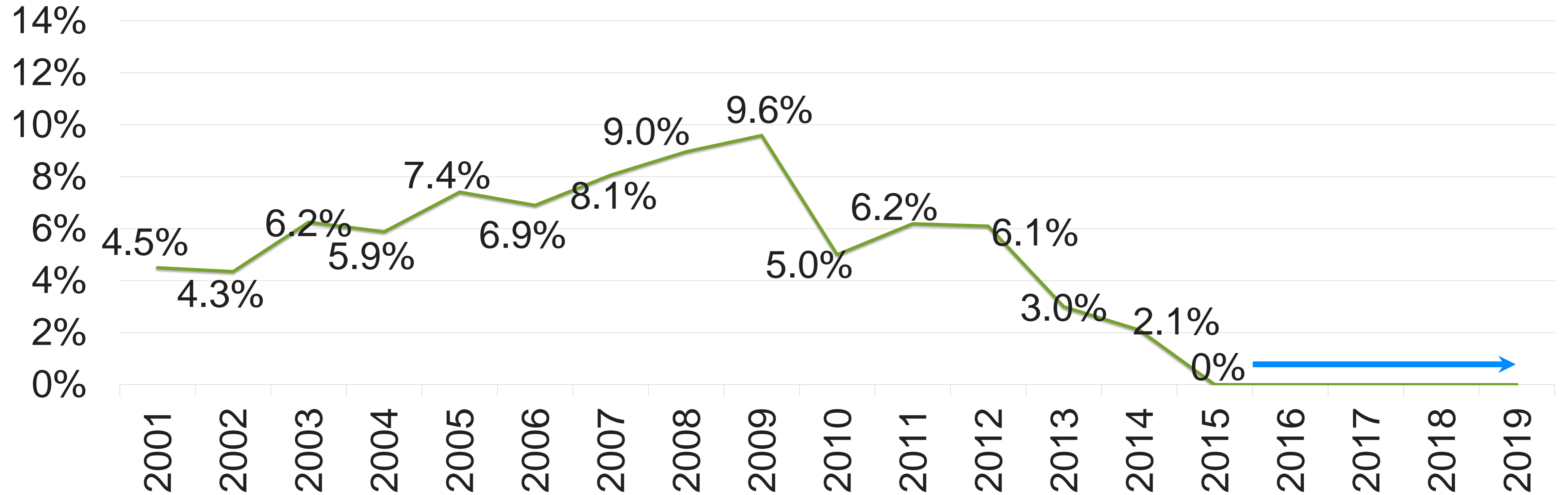
Changes to Commercial SAC



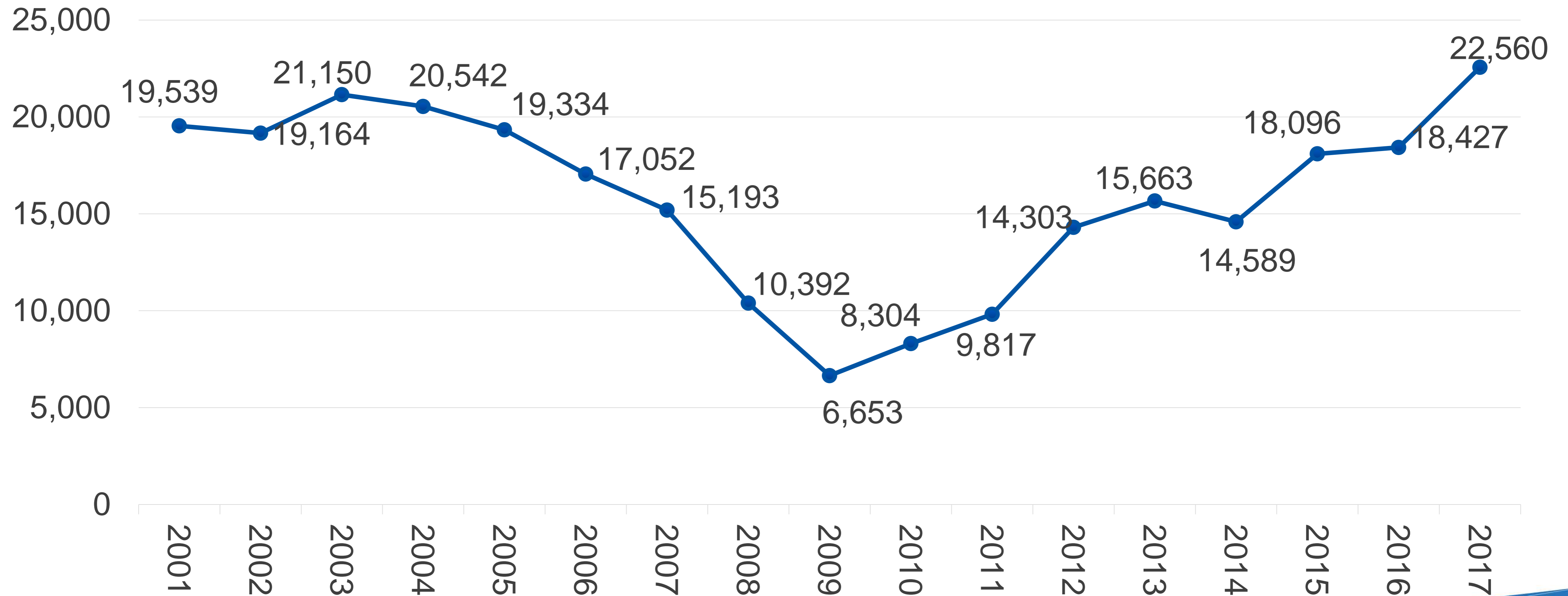
New Grandparent Credit Date



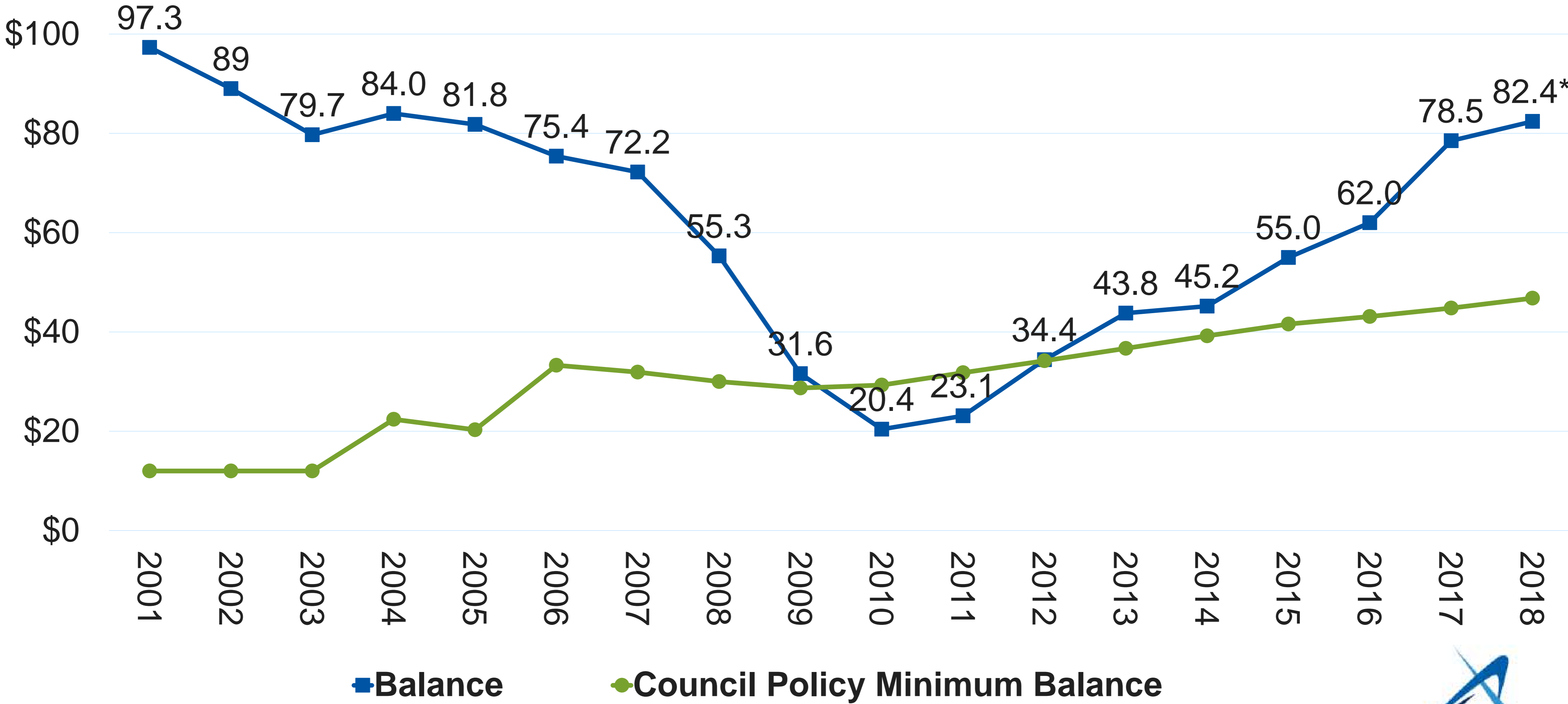
Historical SAC Rate Increases (%)
