Laying the Groundwork: Community Engagement

- Staff met with about 30 community members to introduce ourselves and ask, "What would you like us to know before we write a Government-to-Government Tribal Relations policy?"
- Current and former Equity Advisory Committee members with connections to tribal communities were among the first consulted.



What we heard

- Community members worked in nonprofits, government, Pre-K to college education, arts, business
 - Talk to us first
 - Diverse
 - Consultation
 - Engage everyone regularly
 - Be patient
 - Build organizational capacity
- "What is the benefit to my people?"

Riverview corridor TPP amendment

Four staff-to-staff meetings and one tribal consultation

Insights from tribal communities outreach through public comment period

- Include all 11 federally recognized tribes in project communications when historically and culturally significant places will be impacted
- Continue reaching out until you get a response
- Each tribal community has different needs and expectations
- Use one point of contact to communicate, schedule meetings, share information



Riverview corridor TPP amendment cont.

- Ask how the tribal community wants to be engaged in a project
- Have the appropriate level of contact with the equivalent tribal staff, council member or chair/president
- Tribal members living in the region are not all members of the federally recognized tribes
 - Metro Urban Indian community
 - Mendota Mdewakanton Dakota Tribal Community
- There are members of federally recognized tribes living outside of Minnesota



What's next
