2020 Comment Process to Date

- Draft TPP update has been reviewed by TAC Planning, TAC, TAB, TAAC, Council members, internal Council staff
- Over 100 technical comments
- Comment letters submitted by Minneapolis, St. Paul, Apple Valley, Ramsey County
- Technical/internal review process purpose is to put the best and most complete document out for public review
- Many comments resulted in technical edits and corrections



Comments for 2050 Plan

- Some comments received relating to policy development will be addressed in the 2050 regional planning process
- Issues to be addressed:
 - Climate change scenario planning and regional strategies
 - Better connecting transportation/jobs/housing with a regional vision
 - Better connecting transportation to economic development
 - Focus on access to destinations goal; eliminating emphasis on congestion relief/reduction
 - Vehicle miles traveled reduction and setting a regional target



2018 TPP Update Comments Addressed

- 300 comments;150 people/organizations
- Public hearing: 25 comments; emails received: 90
- Four primary comments:
 - Transit fleet electrification
 - Concern over a diesel spill and its environmental impact
 - Eliminating racially biased transit fare enforcement
 - Free fares
- Other Comments received:
 - Support for better transit connections
 - Safer bicycle/pedestrian infrastructure
 - General advice related to accessibility
 - Support for Arterial BRT investment
