Establish Private Property Inflow and Infiltration Mitigation Task Force, Appoint Chair and Members

Proposed Action

That the Metropolitan Council approve the following recommendations for the roster for the Task Force addressing grant funding for private property inflow and infiltration (I/I) mitigation. The Task Force will design the grant program, discuss how to administer it equitably across the region, and discuss other ways to mitigate I/I from private property. Furthermore, that the proposed members be appointed with Council Member Wendy Wulff as Chair of the Task Force. Also, allow staff to identify replacements of roster members in the event a member(s) can no longer serve on the task force for unforeseen reasons.

Summary of Environment Committee Discussion/Questions

Kyle Colvin, Manager of Wastewater Planning & Community Programs and Ned Smith, Director of Pretreatment and Finance presented updates on the Private Property Inflow/Infiltration (I/I) Grant Task force. A timeline of historical I/I efforts helped showcase how local and regional investments help with the reduction of I/I.

Discussion

CM Vento noted: I want to applaud the efforts to include and expand the participation. I'm pleased that the Council has helped play a role in this.

CM Stern asked: What method are you using to recruit people for the Grant Task Force?

Staff responded: We reviewed the list of past I/I Task Force participation and we also reached out verbally. Minneapolis and St. Paul being the two largest contributors of wastewater in the system agreed to provide representatives. St. Anthony expressed an interest in serving on the taskforce in 2021.

CM Wulff noted: I would like volunteer to serve on the taskforce. She recommended reaching out to West Saint Paul to be involved since they have significant experience in private I/I.

CM Fredson asked: You referenced some communities that are outside of the metro and I'm curious to know to what extent this Task Force will be working with representatives of those communities?

Staff answered: the Task Force will help guide the Council in the guidelines, one of the considerations might be that since the funds are coming from a portion of revenues collected from our Municipal Wastewater Charges, the availability for the funds might be restricted to the 112 communities that are contributing to that funding source. Chair Lindstrom asked: Is that part of the Task Force, to find out where the funds are coming from?

Staff answered: The source of the funding has already been airmarked as being PAY-GO. The PAY-GO is a dedicated reliable set aside funds that we feel we can utilize for the program. The amount will be discussed at the Task Force, the funding level will be a part of the discussion.

Chair Lindstrom asked: Is that part of the Task Force, to find out where the funds are coming from?

Background

Inflow and Infiltration (I/I) are terms that describe stormwater runoff and groundwater that makes its way into sanitary sewer pipes and eventually gets treated unnecessarily at wastewater treatment plants. Inflow is clear water that enters the wastewater system through rain leaders, sump pumps, or foundation drains that are illegally connected to sewer lines. The largest amount of inflow occurs during heavy rainstorms. Infiltration is groundwater that seeps into cracked or broken wastewater pipes.

The Metropolitan Council has previously convened task forces to work with regional communities to address inflow and infiltration. The first task force met in 2003/2004 and recommended that the Council establish the I/I Surcharge Program. The second task force met in 2009/2010 and recommended the Council's Ongoing I/I Program. The third task force met in 2016 and made eight recommendations, one of which was "Support efforts to secure funding for public and private I/I mitigation projects including State Bond and Clean Water Legacy Funds. Consider the provision of financial assistance through regional sources, such as a portion of the wastewater fee, to provide assistance to communities for private property I/I mitigation".

With the update to Statute 471.342, the Metropolitan Council is now allowed to provide financial assistance through communities to private property owners for I/I mitigation activities. It is now appropriate to establish and convene a fourth task force that will be tasked with:

- Design a private property I/I mitigation grant program
- Review peak hour factors used to develop I/I goals

The recommended list of task force members was solicited with the assistance of Metro Cities. Members include representatives with public works, building inspection and development, finance, or city manager experience. The membership is diverse in terms of community size, geographic coverage, and experience with the Council's I/I programs.

Rationale

Private property I/I is the next big challenge to reduce I/I in the system and extend the life and keep capacity of the wastewater system

- The US EPA estimates that up to 80% of inflow and infiltration comes from private property sources.
- Local communities, through their 2040 Comprehensive Sewer Plan submittals, indicate that at least 50% of I/I comes from private property.
- Service laterals connecting private properties to the wastewater collection system are the largest source of inflow and infiltration but receive the least mitigation attention due to several factors:
 - Most property owners are not aware that they own the service lateral or the condition of the lateral.

There is a general lack of support from property owners and real estate agents for point-ofsale programs.

- Communities lack the financial resources to assist property owners with service lateral repairs.
- Case studies show that investing in **both public infrastructure and private property mitigation** yields the greatest reduction in inflow and infiltration. Regional communities and the Metropolitan Council continue to invest significant resources to mitigate inflow and infiltration from public infrastructure; it is time to **complement** those efforts with private property mitigation efforts.
- Failure to address private property sources of inflow and infiltration creates serious financial, environmental, and public health risks, especially as we anticipate more intense and frequent precipitation.

Thrive Lens Analysis

The work of this task force furthers the Thrive Outcomes of Stewardship, Prosperity, Equity, and Sustainability. This task force and resulting program will extend the service life of the Council's interceptor and wastewater treatment plant service life, reduce negative environmental impacts from potential wastewater spills and/or overflows, protect our environment, financially assist residents of the region with a potentially costly home repair, and invests in existing infrastructure. In addition to satisfying the Council's mission and vision, private property I/I mitigation has been a topic of conversation and request of Council members and communities for multiple years. By doing this work, we are responding to our customers and partners.

Funding

Funds for the grant program will come from the Council's revenue from the Municipal Wastewater Charge (MWC).
