- Strategic advice and policy analysis
- Support the Council through work with individual members to foster a reputation as an effective, accountable, and collaborative regional partner in growth.

2024 State of the Region: Sharing our values, vision and impact

Over 200 representatives of city, county, and regional governments attended

- Connections made at this event led to dozens more meetings with local partners to address issues or coordinate regional affairs
- Attendees were offered resources on council services, information on council members and ways to connect

Panel members shared experiences planning for a brighter future for the Twin Cities

- Speakers outlined the hopes for Imagine 2050 and our renewed commitment to collaboration with local partners
- Attendees reported that they appreciated hearing from regional thinkers who are leading changes to the regional vision for the Twin Cities






2024 Highlights

- 41 Council and Committee of the Whole meetings
 - Major Accomplishments: American Indian Advisory Council commitments, Regional Development Guide 90% Draft, Safety and Security Action Plan
- 76 Committee meetings
 - Major Accomplishments: Workforce Dashboard, LCA program review, Network Now, GHG goals and benchmarks
- 43 meetings of TAB, MPOSC, EAC, LUAC, TAAC and WASAC
 - Major Accomplishments: EAC Bylaws and membership, Water Policy Plan, Land Use policy recommendations
- 52 meetings of TAB and associated groups
 - Regional Solicitation, evaluation policymaker working group
- 54 meetings with jurisdictional partners on major infrastructure projects
 - Major Accomplishments: Blue Line Extension municipal consent and anti-displacement efforts, progress toward Green Line Extension completion, Gold Line, Purple Line, and Hwy 55 meetings



Communities Visited: By the numbers

- Nearly one hundred official city and township visits
- Five county government visits
- Meetings with dozens of County Commissioners
- More than 500 Met Council facilitated meetings that include the public
- More than 200 meetings with nonprofits, advocacy groups, regional governments, and associations

Meeting people where they are


- Community Relations submits an official engagement report to the Governor's Office each week
- This report includes events from Council Member calendars and other events that staff know members plan to attend.
- Community Relations estimates that this represents less than half of the actual 'engagement' from council members but gives a good picture of how much goes on in a year
