2025 legislative session



Session overview

- 2025 was a "budget year" legislature sets the budget for the upcoming state fiscal years (FY) 26-27 biennium.
 - State fiscal year is July 1-June 30.
 - Governor proposed a 2-year budget for the state based on budget forecasts in November 2024 and February 2025.
 - Focus is on larger omnibus finance bills that may also include policy.
- Legislature met from January 14 to May 19, and in a one-day special session on June 9, to wrap up the budget.

2025 regular session outcomes

Legacy omnibus bill (HF 2563)

Clean Water Fund:

- \$2.75 million for the Met Council's Water Sustainability Support program, for projects to address emerging drinking water supply threats and overall water sustainability.
- **\$1.4 million** for the Council's Water Demand Reduction Grant program, which provides grants to municipalities for projects that encourage implementation of water demand reduction and efficiency measures.

Parks and Trails Fund:

- \$24.31 million in FY2026 and \$27.222 million in FY2027 for the Metropolitan Regional Parks System.
 - Continues the 40/40/20 split.
 - Met Council matches the 10% statutorily directed to land acquisition with \$2 of regional funds for every \$3 of state funds.
 - Park implementing agencies match 25% of total acquisition costs.







2025 regular session outcomes

Judiciary and public safety omnibus bill (HF 2432)

- Updates the Minnesota Government Data Practices Act to include certain Metropolitan Council leaders as "public officials" as defined in Minnesota Statutes, section 13.43.
- Identifies additional executive positions that • would be subject to certain public disclosures under Minnesota Statutes, section 13.43, subdivision 2, paragraph (e), clause (4), subparagraph (i).

- The language includes the following Met ٠ Council leaders as a "public official:"
 - Met Council chair and Council members
 - Regional administrator
 - Deputy regional administrator 0
 - General counsel
 - Executive heads of divisions (Community 0 Development, Environmental Services, Metro Transit, Metropolitan Transportation Services)
 - Executive head responsible for 0 compliance with Equal Employment Opportunity provisions (OEEO director)
 - Metro Transit police chief 0

2025 special session outcomes - funding

Omnibus transportation bill (HF 14 – First special session)

- **\$3.502 million** in general funds for FY26-27 for transit operations (reduction of \$61.4 million).
 - **\$40.028 million** in general funds is expected for FY28-29 (reduction of \$24.88) million).
- Base general funding for Metro Mobility and Metro Move services \$112.507 million in FY26 and **\$118.34 million** in FY27.
- Regional Transit Capital (RTC) Bond authorization.
 - Authority to issue up to **\$54.6 million** after July 1, 2025.
 - Authority to issue up to **\$56.2 million** after July 1, 2026.
 - Department of Revenue retains approx. **\$1.8 million** in FY27 and **\$3.9 million** in FY28-29 of the regional sales tax for transportation to account for general fund interaction of bond issuance.

2025 special session outcomes - funding

Omnibus transportation bill (HF 14 – First special session)

- **\$1.4 million** in FY26 from the regional sales tax to four transportation management organizations in the metro area.
- **\$8 million** for Washington Avenue bridge suicide prevention barriers. \bullet
 - \$2 million from the active transportation portion of the regional sales tax that goes to the Transportation Advisory Board.
 - \$6 million from the Hennepin County local option sales tax.

2025 special session outcomes - policy

Omnibus transportation bill (HF 14 – First special session)

- Loan authorization from Met Council to MnDOT to advance METRO F Line and **Riverview BRT projects** – up to **\$250 million** in funds from the regional transportation sales tax to coordinate major highway and transitway construction in key trunk highway and BRT corridors.
- Make fares on regular route transit free for Metro Mobility riders makes permanent part of the pilot fare initiative from 2023 session.
- Alignment of Met Council procurement rules with state procurement rules aligns Met Council procurement authority with laws for state agencies regarding procurement of goods and services from small and targeted businesses.
- Change to legislative reporting requirements around transportation finance and • cleaning and repair standards.



2025 special session outcomes - policy

Omnibus transportation bill (HF 14 – First special session)

- **Bus rapid transit alternate mode analysis** directs the Met Council to analyze alternate transit options in the METRO Blue Line Extension corridor.
- **High-subsidy transit service analysis** directs the Met Council to analyze high-subsidy regular transit routes.
- Special transportation service forecasting analysis requires MnDOT to analyze Met Council forecasting practices for Metro Mobility.
- **MnDOT study on wheelchair accessible vehicle supply and availability** the study will examine the supply and demand of wheelchair accessible vehicles and wheelchair accessible transportation services.

2025 special session outcomes

Omnibus environment bill (SF 3 – First special session)

- **\$2.54 million** from the general fund and **\$9.2 million** from the natural resources fund (lottery-in-lieu) in each of the next two fiscal years (FY26 and FY27) for regional parks operations and maintenance.
 - Total of \$23.48 million for the upcoming biennium.
 - Increase of **\$250,000** annually from the natural resources fund.
 - 100% passed through to regional parks implementing agencies using distribution formula in statute.
- **\$750,000** in FY26 from the general fund for additional resources for the White Bear Lake Area Comprehensive Plan Work Group (previously established in 2023 with a \$2 million appropriation).
- **\$900,000** in FY26 from the general fund for Community Tree Planting grants and technical modification to criteria language for community tree planting statute.

2025 special session outcomes - bonding

Capital investment bill (HF 18 – First special session)

- **\$15 million** in general obligation bonds to address inflow and infiltration (I/I) into the regional wastewater system.
- **\$1 million** in general obligation bonds for community tree planting grants.
- Governor Walz recommended **\$5 million** for BRT and **\$1.5 million** for regional • parks and trails capital grant program. Funding for these items were **not included** in the bonding bill.
