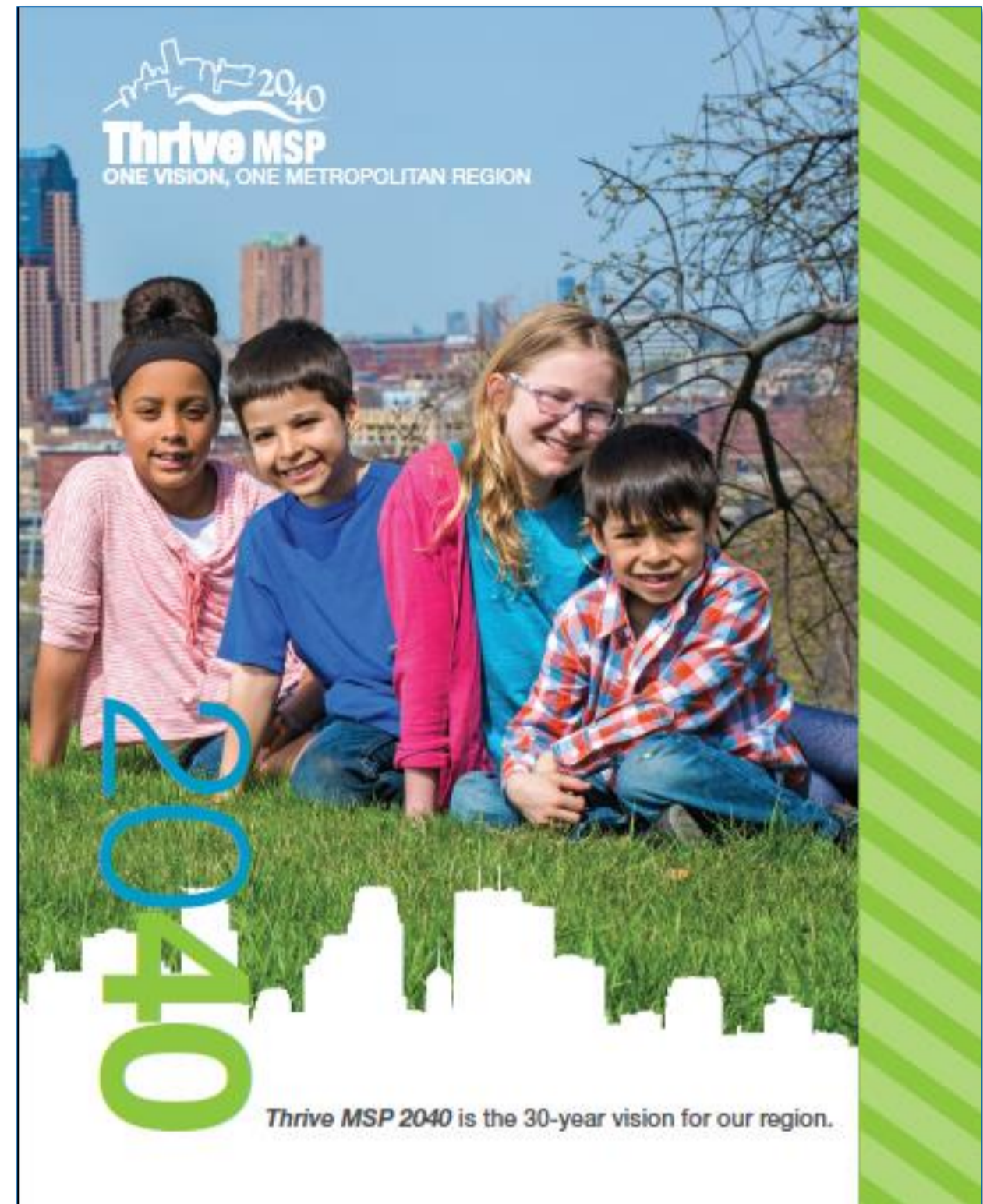

(M.S. 473.145)

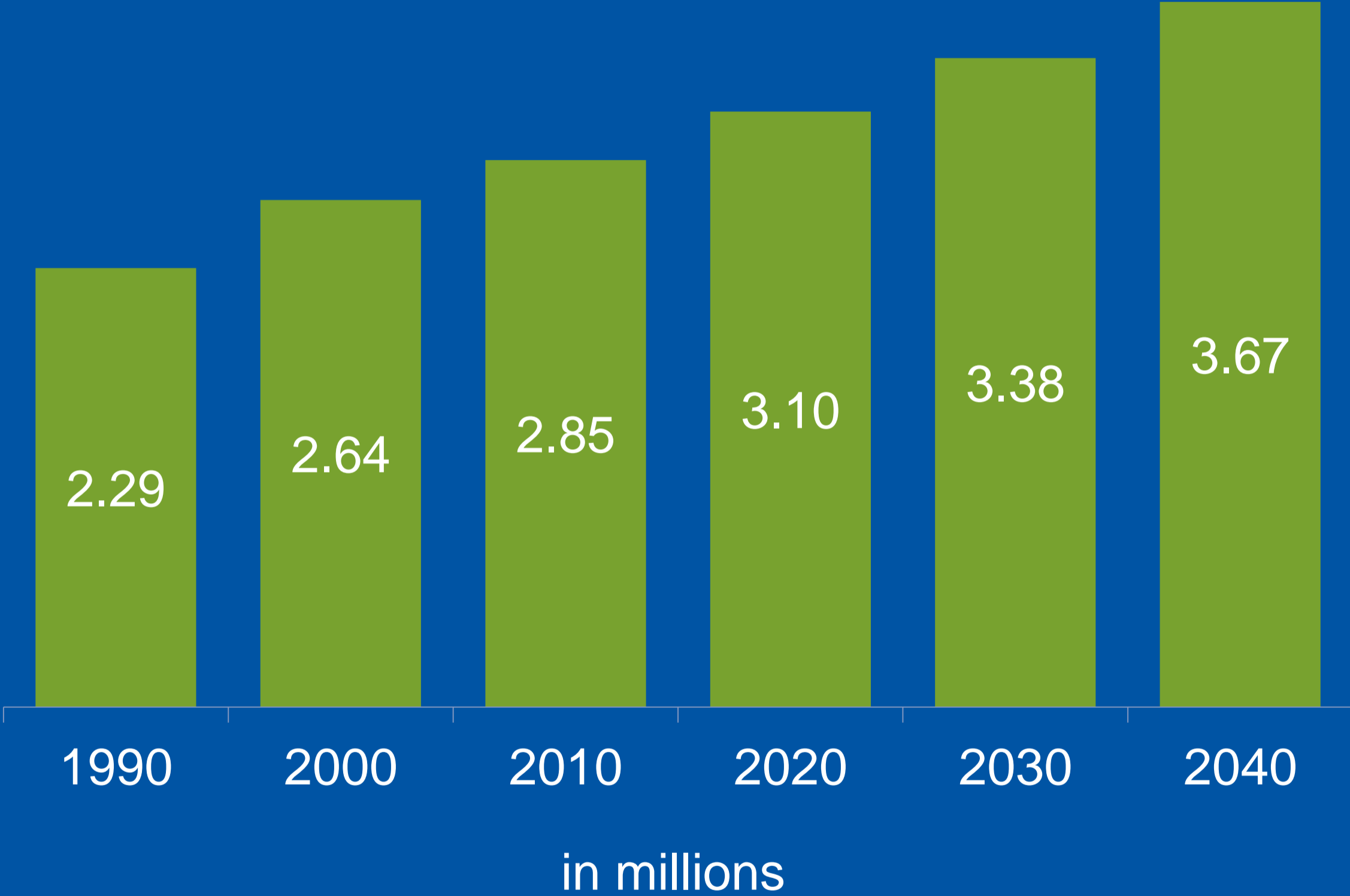

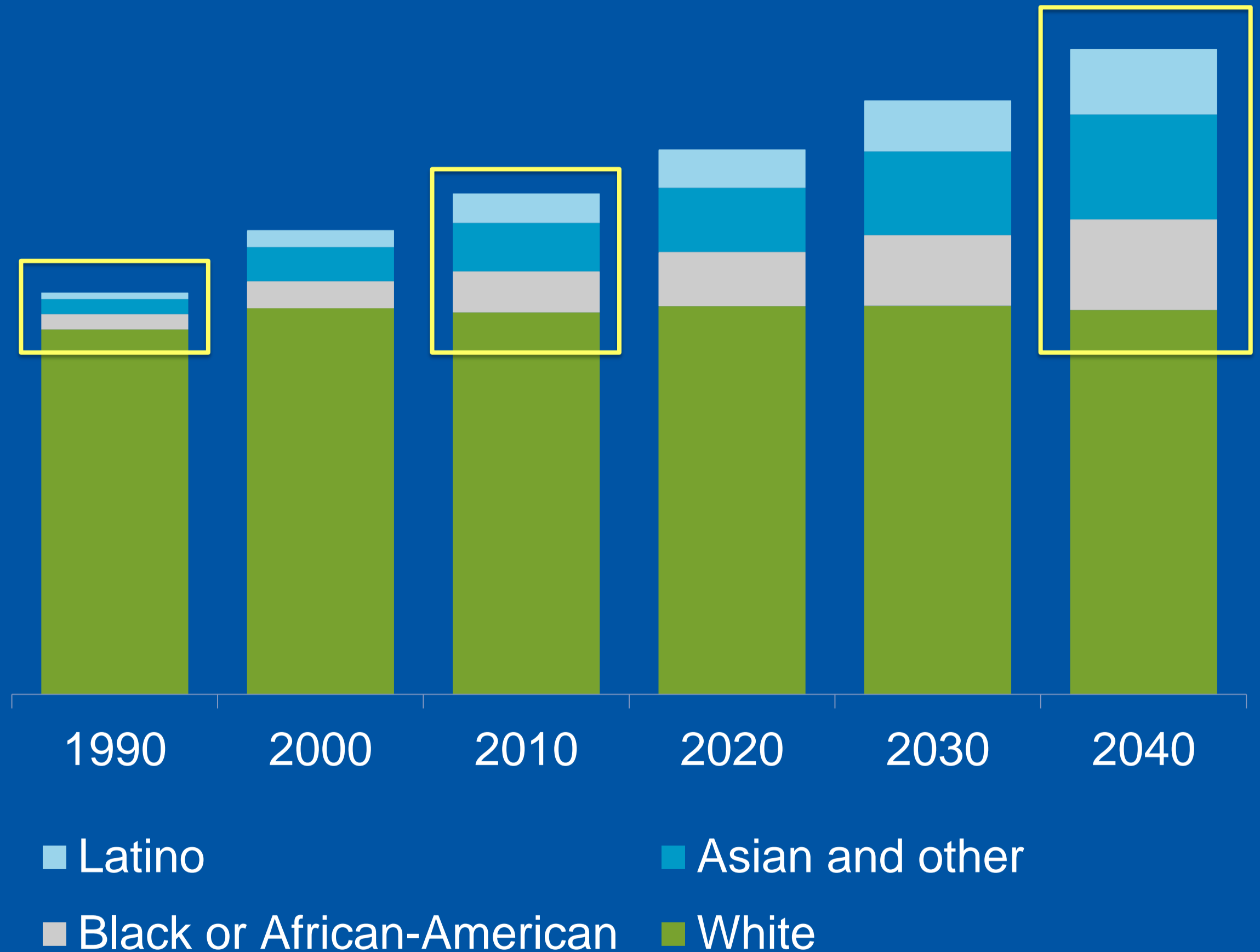

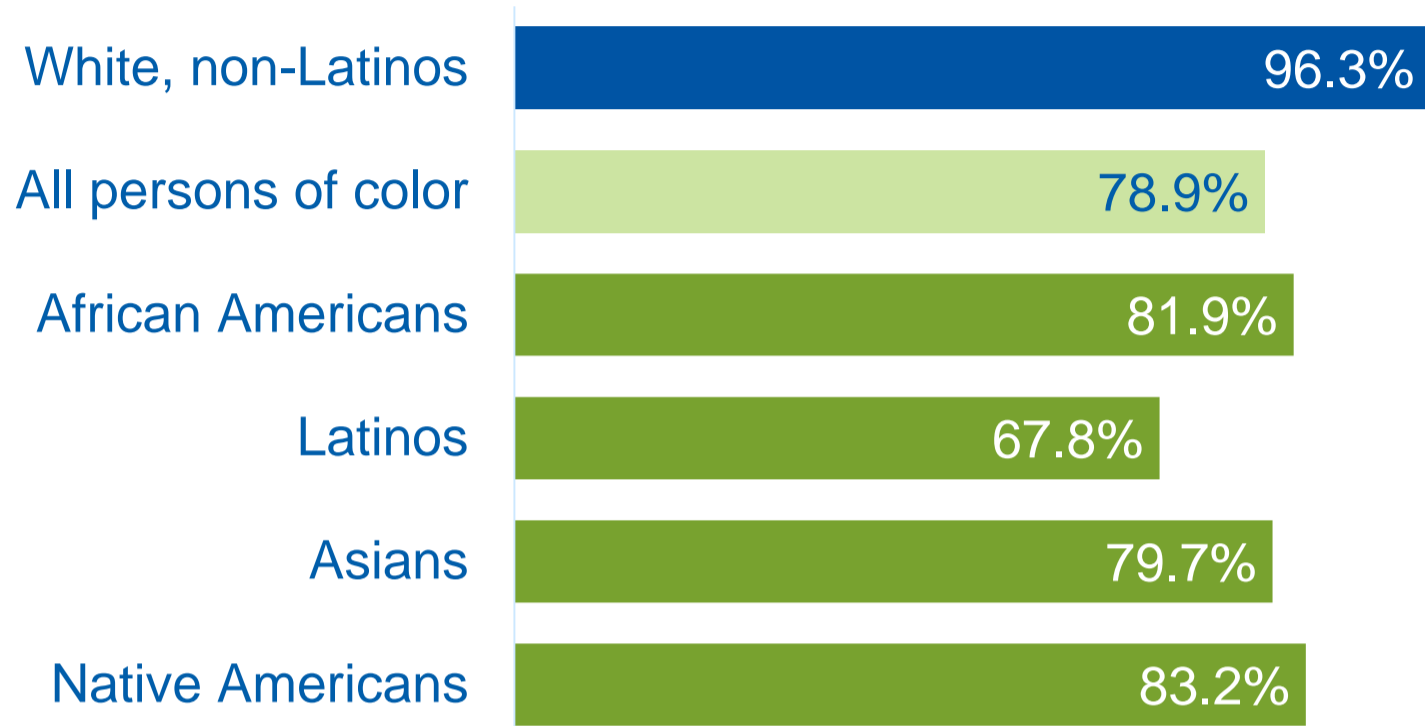

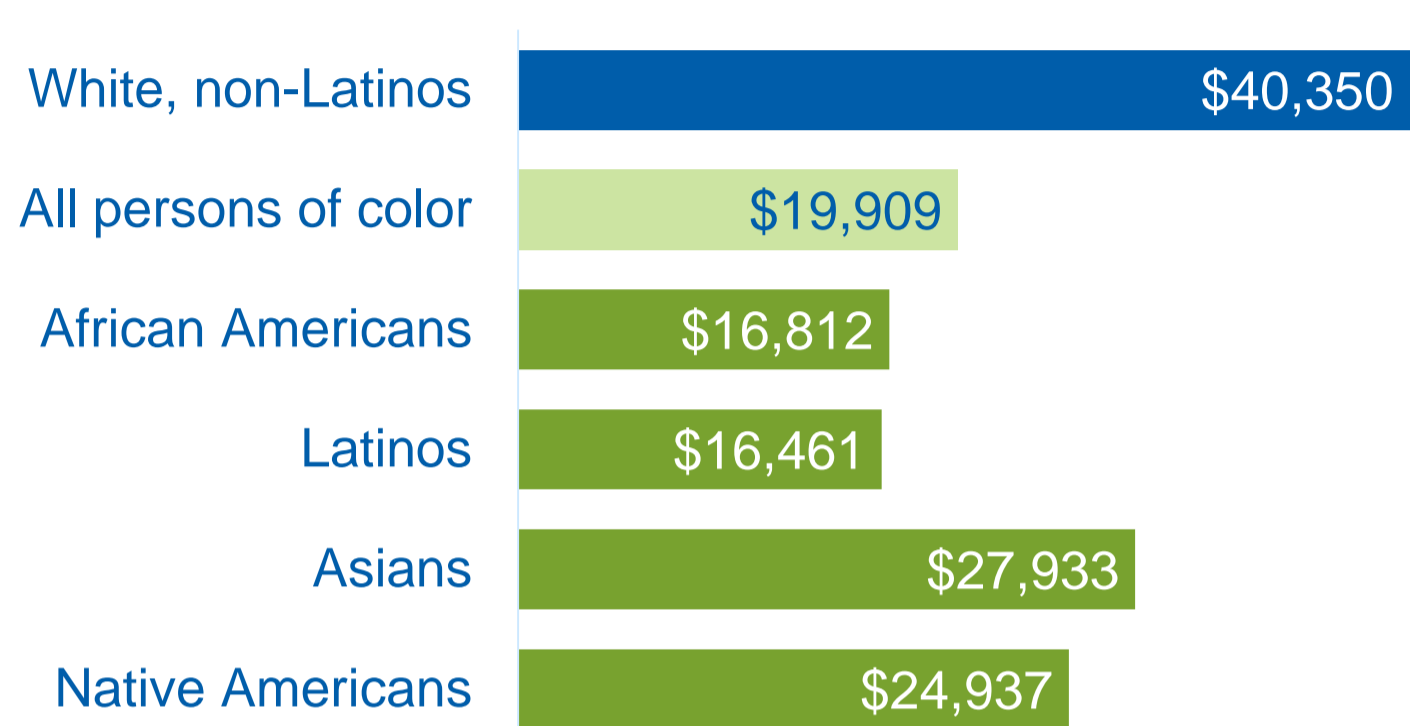

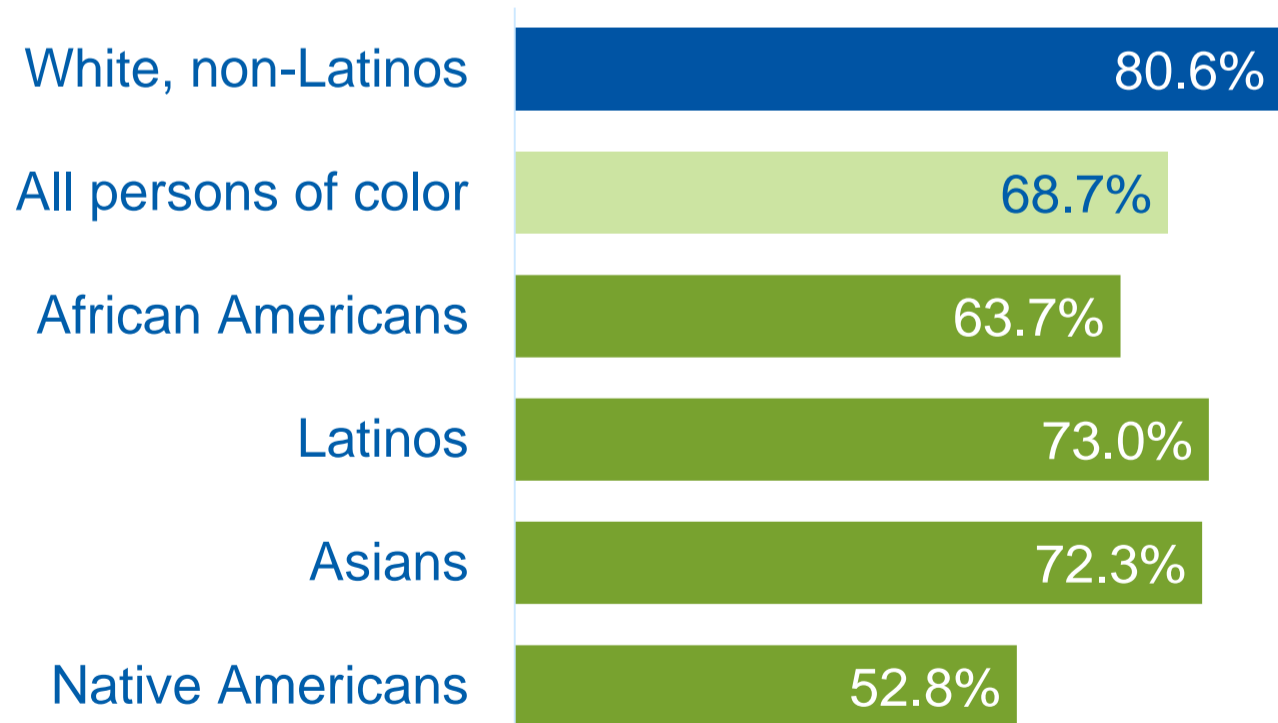
## High school diploma or more



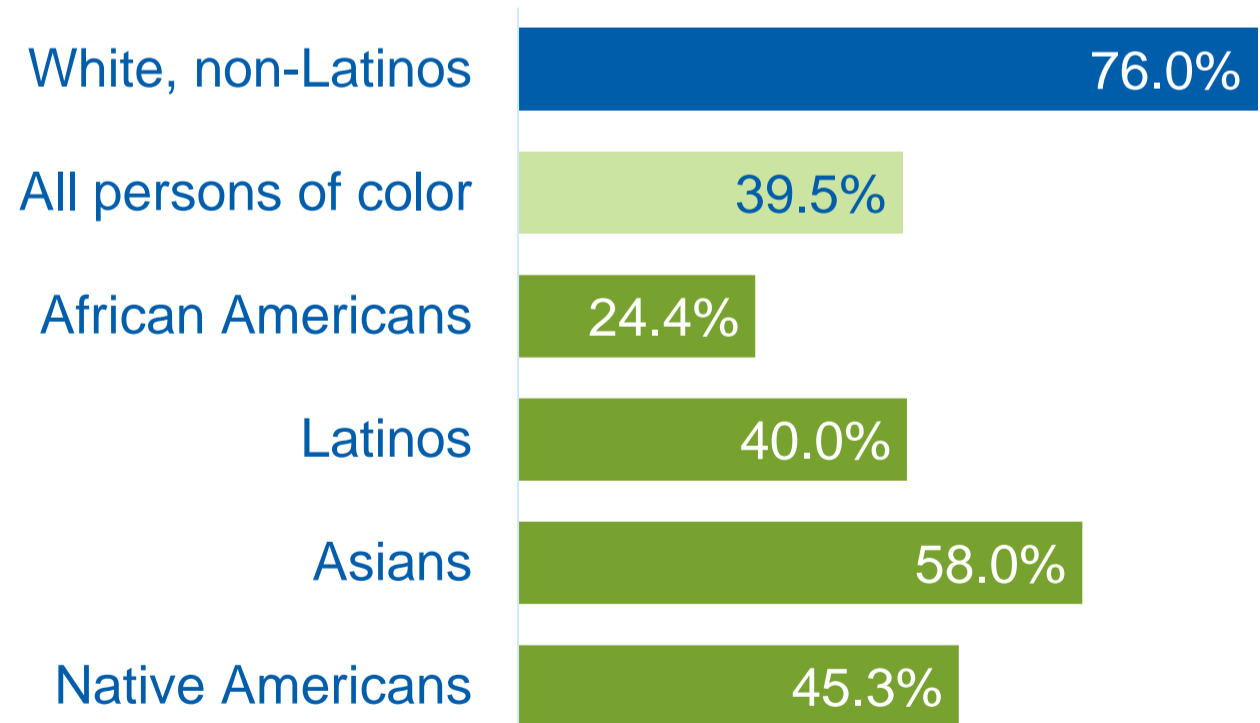
## Per capita income

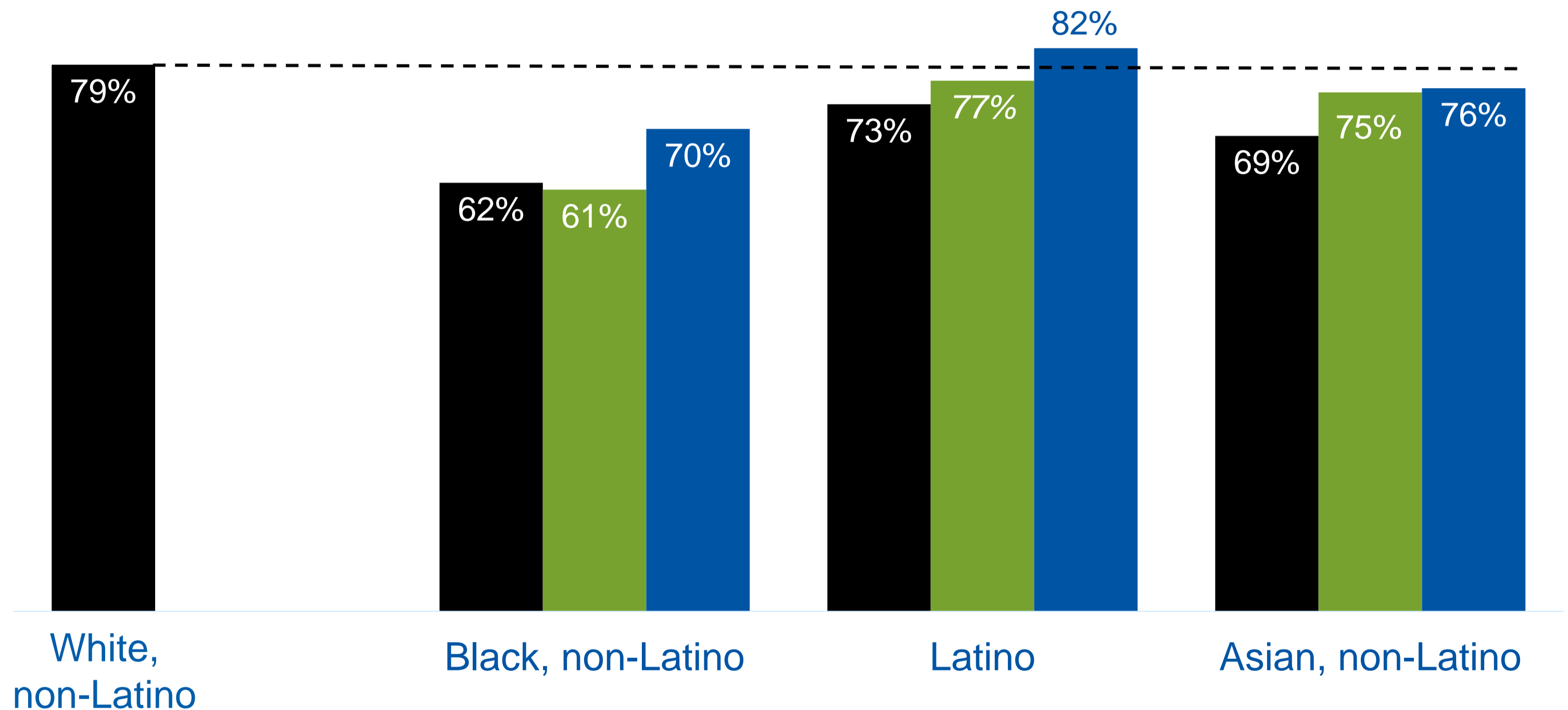

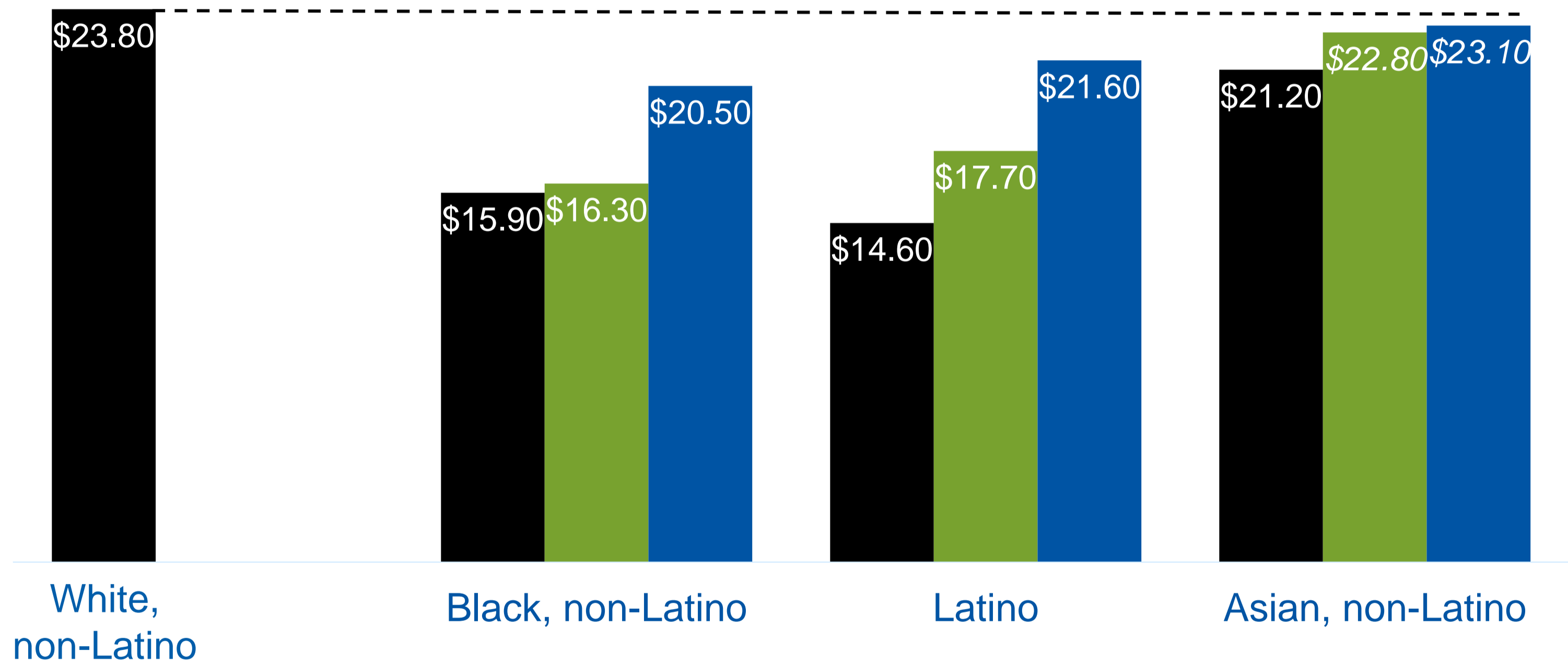

# Statistical adjustments: Average hourly wages

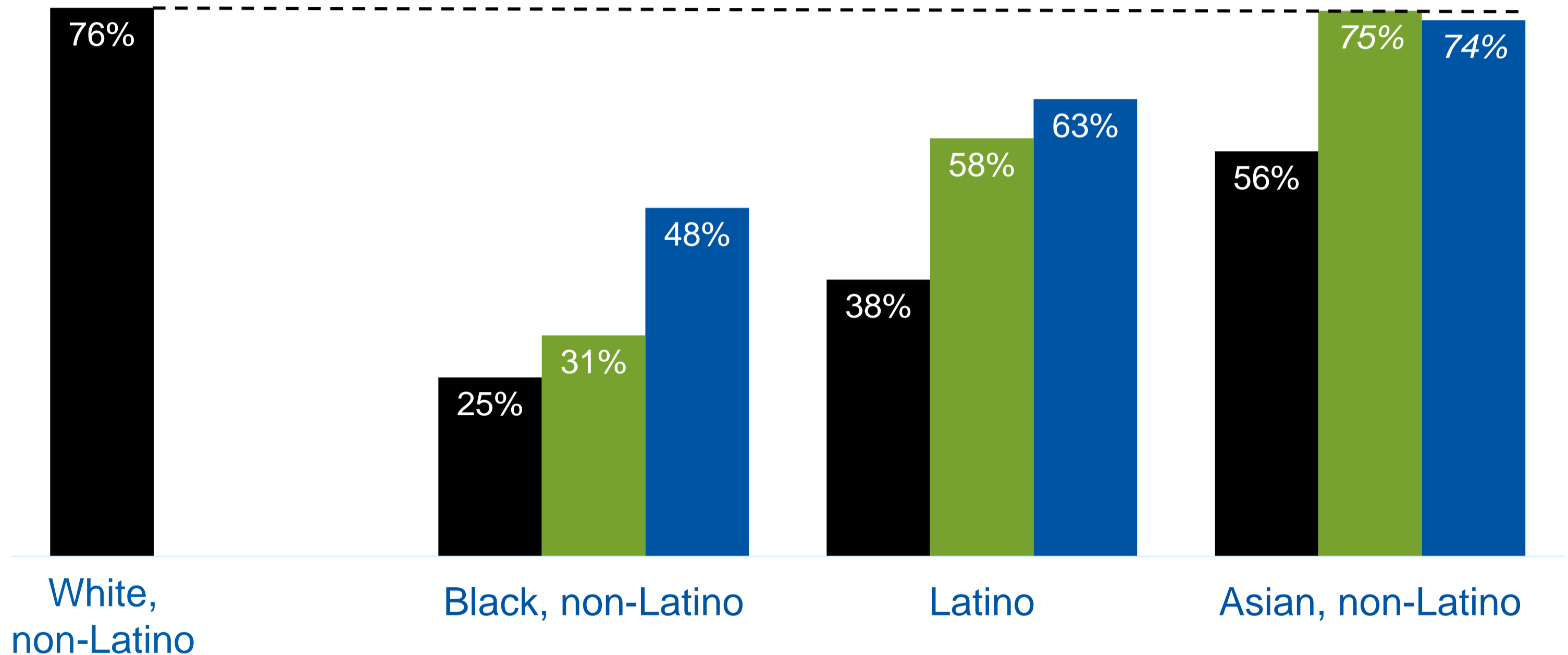
