

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Better Bus Stops: Enhance access to opportunity by investing in bus stops



Better Bus Stops Focus Neighborhoods

- Neighborhoods being considered for bus stop improvements
- Specific areas within neighborhoods as priority areas for investment (ACP50)





Capital Project

- Add up to 150 new shelters
- Improve up to 75 existing shelters with light, heat
- Approximately half-way complete at end of 2016

Community Engagement Numbers

- 7,000 people participated in community engagement
- 2,013 Metro Transit surveys completed
 - Survey respondents from focus area and all 7 counties
 - Survey respondents' race, income, age generally the same as what we know about transit riders
 - Nearly 20% of respondents indicated having a disability
- 2,230 customized surveys
- 200 community events
 - 40 neighborhoods
 - 11 cities







What Did We Learn?

Priorities for **Shelter Placement Guidelines**:

- Where many people wait for the bus
- Near hospitals, social service centers, senior housing
- Where residents don't have a car and rely on transit
- Shelters are very important also transit information, lighting, heat, benches
