8.0 PUBLIC AND AGENCY INVOLVEMENT PROGRAM

8.1 INTRODUCTION

This chapter presents the public and agency outreach efforts that have taken place during the development of the *Central Corridor Environmental Impact Statement (EIS)*.

At the onset of the Central Corridor Transit Study, a Public and Agency Involvement Program was developed that identified public outreach techniques and activities to support the decision-making process. The Public and Agency Involvement Program followed guidelines set forth in the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA), and activities outlined in the program have guided public and agency involvement from initial planning activities through the EIS. The goal of the public outreach effort has been to encourage public and agency participation throughout the transportation decision-making process, including development of alternatives, assessment of potential social, economic, environmental and transportation impacts and identification of areas and issues that will require mitigation.

The Public and Agency Involvement Program was developed during the initial stages of the Central Corridor Transit Study by the Ramsey County Regional Railroad Authority (RCRRA). All program activities were managed by RCRRA. The purpose of the program is to support decision-making efforts and encourage an open, collaborative approach regarding a balanced transportation system. The program recognized that the key elements to an effective process are to actively involve the community and to create enthusiasm for the transit project and sustainable development along the corridor. The specific objectives of the Central Corridor Public and Agency Involvement Program are to:

- Communicate with and involve local residents in refining the proposed alternatives
- Communicate with and educate the public, neighborhoods, and agencies within the corridor on the opportunities and impacts the project presents for their community and/ or area of interest
- Involve local residents in the decision-making process thereby creating a sense of public ownership of the project
- Gain insights into issues of greatest concern or interest to the public and municipalities of the corridor and incorporate them into the decision-making process
- Meet and/or exceed the requirements and intent of federal, state, and local public involvement policies in a manner that is consistent with the federal NEPA process

During the initial stages of the Central Corridor Transit Study the public was invited to participate through public information meetings and telephone surveys. Public and agency outreach activities were employed at the key decision points of the Central Corridor Transit Study and these continued into the EIS Scoping Process. These activities with all affected municipalities within the corridor will be continued through the completion of the EIS. The major public and agency involvement activities conducted during the preparation of the EIS are described in the subsequent text of this chapter.



8.2 KEY CONSTITUENCY INTERVIEWS

At the start of the Central Corridor Transit Study, interviews were conducted with approximately 35 members of diverse groups of policymakers, advocacy groups, business leaders and community and neighborhood organizations within the Central Corridor. The interviews were conducted between late April and early June 2000. The purposes of the interviews were two-fold:

- To identify issues and concerns important to the community as a whole
- To identify perceptions and attitudes about transit and transportation issues

The results of the interviews resulted in recommendations on how to engage the public in making decisions, how to effectively use the public and media relations to reach the broadest audiences possible, and to identify critical issues and concerns that should be incorporated into public involvement communications.

The detailed results of the key constituency interviews are available in *Ramsey County Regional Railroad Authority Communications Audit*, June 2000. These results served as the foundation in the development of the integrated public and agency involvement communications work plan used throughout the Central Corridor Transit Study and EIS Process.

8.3 OUTREACH TECHNIQUES

The Public and Agency Involvement Program implemented throughout the preparation of the EIS provided a variety of opportunities for communication, education and public comment at key decision points. In addition to regularly scheduled meetings, workshops and briefings, outreach techniques for citizens, elected officials and agencies used throughout EIS preparation included the following:

- Web Site continuously updated with Central Corridor information
- E-mail comment opportunity
- TDD telephone
- Newsletters
- Speakers bureau presentations
- Media Alerts and news releases
- Interviews with key stakeholders
- Survey of residents along the Central Corridor
- Public presentations and briefings
- Presentations at meetings of neighborhoods, businesses and other corridor groups
- Agency coordination meetings
- Committee/task-force meetings

The above outreach techniques were applied during EIS preparation as described for the following major activities:

- EIS Scoping Process
- Coordinating Committees



- Outreach Activities
- Other Outreach Activities

8.4 OUTREACH DURING ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT STATEMENT (EIS) SCOPING PROCESS

The initiation of the EIS for the proposed Central Corridor project began with a formal EIS Scoping Process. The EIS Scoping Process is used to publicly announce the alternatives being considered for inclusion in the Draft EIS and to seek out additional options which could be examined. The purpose of the EIS Scoping Process is to determine the scope and significance of social, economic, environmental and transportation issues associated with the potential alternatives and the proposed action. The process provides opportunities to inform the public, government agencies, elected officials, organizations and businesses that the EIS Process is commencing and to hear about issues of concern to them.

8.4.1 Notice of Intent (NOI) and Scoping Booklet

The NOI to prepare an EIS for the project was published in the *Federal Register* on June 5, 2001. In addition, the Notice of Availability (NOA) of the *Central Corridor Scoping Booklet* and announcements of the Scoping Meetings were published in the *Minnesota Environmental Quality Board (EQB) Monitor* on June 11, 2001. The formal scoping comment period extended from June 11 to July 20, 2001.

The Central Corridor Coordinating Committee (CCCC) distributed the *Central Corridor Scoping Booklet* to over 800 federal, state and local agencies having jurisdiction in the project, all interested parties on the RCRRA mailing list, elected officials, neighborhood organizations and civic groups. The scoping booklet included descriptions of the project, alternatives, and issues identified for consideration in the EIS.

8.4.2 Distribution of Scoping Meetings Notice

In addition to the notices in the *Federal Register, Minnesota EQB Monitor* and local newspapers, the public was given notice of the Scoping Meetings in the following ways:

- Letters of invitation to the Scoping Meetings were sent directly to federal, state, local
 agencies, and elected officials involved with and having jurisdiction for the proposed
 Central Corridor project.
- Scoping booklets with meeting notices were mailed to approximately 800 people on the RCRRA mailing list which includes federal, state and local agencies having jurisdiction in the project, all interested parties, elected officials, neighborhood organizations and civic groups.

8.4.3 Notice of Scoping Meetings in Newspapers

In addition to appearing in the June 5, 2001 *Federal Register* and the June 11, 2001 *Minnesota EQB Monitor*, public notices of Scoping Meetings were placed in the following local newspapers on the following dates:

8.4.4 Agency Scoping Meeting

Agency coordination is critical to reaching agreement and achieving consensus on various aspects of the proposed project. Effective production and implementation of the proposed project will require ongoing coordination between the CCCC and the public planning, resource, regulatory and permitting agencies. One Agency Scoping Meeting was held as indicated below.

The Agency Scoping Meeting included a presentation of the results of the alternatives screening process, the alternatives recommended for inclusion in the EIS, the issues to be considered in the EIS, the schedule for EIS completion, and the Public and Agency Involvement Program to support EIS activities.

Information packets were distributed at the meeting and included an agenda, comment sheet, and *Central Corridor Scoping Booklet*. Display boards of the EIS Process and preliminary alternatives were available for viewing before, during, and after the presentation.

8.4.5 Public Scoping Meetings

Public Scoping Meetings were held to inform the public that the EIS Process is commencing and to solicit the issues of concern to them. Three Public Scoping Meetings were held as indicated below.

Information packets were distributed at each of the meetings and included an agenda, comment sheet, and *Central Corridor Scoping Booklet*. Display boards of the EIS Process and preliminary alternatives were available for viewing before, during, and after the presentations.

Verbal questions and comments were solicited from both public and agency Scoping Meeting participants. Verbal comments were transcribed by a court reporter. Written comments were encouraged through the use of formal comment sheets, which were available at the meetings.

All written and verbal comments received at the formal public Scoping Meetings, by mail, or via the web page during the scoping period are recorded and addressed in the *Central Corridor Scoping Summary Report*, Section 7.0: Scoping Comments and Responses.

Comments made during the EIS Scoping Process were incorporated into the process of selection of the proposed alternatives for inclusion in the EIS and into the impact assessment criteria to be



used in evaluating the alternatives. In addition, comments received were used to help define the social, economic, environmental and transportation factors to be addressed in the EIS, and the types of technical analyses to be completed.

8.5 CENTRAL CORRIDOR ORGANIZATIONS AND COMMITTEES

The following sections describe the composition and function of each group or organization providing coordination, along with their responsibilities and intra-relationships within the framework of the proposed Central Corridor project.

8.5.1 Minnesota Department of Transportation (Mn/DOT) Commissioner

The Mn/DOT coordinates transportation planning for the State. The Governor appoints the Mn/DOT Commissioner who serves as the chief administrator of the Mn/DOT organization. The Mn/DOT Commissioner has responsibilities for commuter and LRT as directed by the legislature.

8.5.2 Twin Cities Metropolitan Council

The Twin Cities Metropolitan Council is the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) for the Twin Cities Metropolitan Area and the operator of most transit service in the region. The MPO is a council of local government agencies that directs transportation planning and programming for the urbanized area. The MPO collects data on transportation conditions, forecasts funding, and determines policies and projects for implementation. These activities are assembled into the five-year Transportation Improvement Plan (TIP) and the 20-year Long Range Transportation Plan (LRTP). The Metropolitan Council will review final recommendations for the proposed Central Corridor project, and will be responsible for adoption of any actions into the LRTP, in conjunction with the Mn/DOT Commissioner. The Metropolitan Council would be the operator of either of the build alternatives in this corridor.

8.5.3 Ramsey County Regional Railroad Authority (RCRRA)

The RCRRA is the county agency that conducts passenger rail policy and planning for Ramsey County. RCRRA sponsored the Central Corridor Transit Study, and is responsible for overall management of the decision-making process and completion of the EIS for the proposed Central Corridor project.

8.5.4 Hennepin County Regional Railroad Authority (HCRRA)

The HCRRA was established in 1980 to plan and design rail transit in Hennepin County. The Board of Commissioners for HCRRA consists of the seven members of the Hennepin County Board of Commissioners.

8.5.5 Central Corridor Coordinating Committee (CCCC)

The CCCC assesses technical information and recommendations from the PMT and policy recommendations from local jurisdictions and boards. This information and advice are used to establish transit recommendations for the Metropolitan Council and the Mn/DOT Commissioner.



To ensure an inclusive, multi-jurisdictional process, the CCCC is composed of the following agencies:

- Mn/DOT (2 representatives)
- City of St. Paul
- City of Minneapolis
- Hennepin County
- Ramsey County (2 representatives)
- Metropolitan Council (2 representatives)
- University of Minnesota
- Red Rock Corridor (voting on commuter rail elements)
- Northstar Corridor (non-voting member)

The CCCC conducted regularly scheduled monthly meetings during 2000 and 2001, and is scheduled to continue through 2002. Unless otherwise notified, the regular meetings begin at 3:30 p.m. on the second Thursday of each month and are held in the Hennepin Room at the Metro Transit Training Facility, located at 1919 University Avenue West, St. Paul. The CCCCs overall organization and functional relationships are indicated on Figure 8.5-1: Organization Chart

At a meeting on June 13, 2002 the CCCC indicated its initial preference for the LRT Alternative for the Central Corridor. A final recommendation will be made after the public comment period ends. The vote of committee members was seven in favor and three abstentions (Thakur, Zerby, and Rettman).

8.5.6 Project Management Team (PMT)

The PMT provides recommendations to the CCCC on technical information regarding transit alternatives for the Central Corridor. The role of the PMT is to assist the CCCC in making recommendations to the Mn/DOT Commissioner and the Metropolitan Council. The PMT provides technical guidance to local jurisdictions and boards, who in turn will make policy recommendations to the CCCC. The PMT is composed of the following agencies and organizations:

- Capitol Area Architectural and Planning Board (CAAPB)
- City of Minneapolis
- City of St. Paul
- Hennepin County Regional Railroad Authority (HCRRA)
- Metro Transit
- Minnesota Department of Transportation (Mn/DOT)
- Ramsey County Public Works
- Ramsey County Regional Railroad Authority (RCRRA)
- Twin Cities Metropolitan Council
- University of Minnesota



- Washington County Regional Railroad Authority (WCRRA)
- Anoka County Regional Railroad Authority (ACRRA)

The PMT meets once a month to review and comment on environmental and technical analysis and makes recommendations to the CCCC.

8.5.7 Local Jurisdictions and Boards

Local agencies, such as city and county governments, are involved at all stages of the decision-making process throughout the Transit Study and EIS for the proposed Central Corridor project. Special committees comprised of representatives of local jurisdictions have been engaged to facilitate the completion of specific tasks. An example of such a committee is the formulation of a Traffic Impact Analysis Committee comprised of representatives of local, county, regional and state governments to oversee and provide input into potential traffic mitigation measures. Meetings of stakeholder groups such as the foregoing are enumerated in Table 8.6-1: Stakeholder Meetings. Using information from the PMT, these agencies also provide advice to the CCCC.

The Metropolitan Council operates almost all of the transit service in the corridor. If a build alternative is selected as the Locally Preferred Alternative, it will be the operator. The Council will be the Federal grantee for the project. A Corridor Management Committee made up of policy level representatives of agencies along the corridor will advise the project. A staff level Project Management Team will also provide direction. Memoranda of Understanding will be developed with Mn/DOT and local jurisdictions to implement a Project Management Plan that will be developed for the project.

8.5.8 Citizen Groups

Public participation is included throughout the EIS Process from a variety of citizen group stakeholders, including but not limited to:

- Environmental Groups
- Homeowners Associations
- Business and Small Business Organizations
- Downtown Partnerships and Chambers of Commerce
- District Councils
- Neighborhood Groups

The positions of these citizen groups vis-à-vis the issues of the proposed Central Corridor project are made available to the PMT, Local Boards and Jurisdictions, the CCCC, the RCRRA, the HCRRA, the Metropolitan Council, and the Mn/DOT Commissioner throughout the EIS Process.

8.6 OUTREACH ACTIVITIES

This section describes the following outreach activities that took place during the EIS Process that were used to educate and inform people about potential transit facilities in the Central Corridor and to capture their opinions for the decision-making process.



- Speakers Bureau and Business Briefings
- Stakeholder Meetings
- Community Meetings

8.6.1 Speakers Bureau

The RCRRA Speakers Bureau was developed and trained to share Central Corridor information with the public and special interest groups and to receive feedback from them. A typical format for a Speakers Bureau presentation is in the form of a business briefing, including an informal report of the proposed project status and establishing an environment for soliciting information, feedback and ideas. The Speakers Bureau is composed of spokespeople equipped with appropriate materials, including presentation materials, audio/ visual support and informational materials to leave with audiences. Speakers Bureau speaking opportunities were sought through civic and service organizations, community events, and other public forums. Project information was made available in Amharic, Hmong, Spanish, Somali, and Vietnamese.

As indicated in Table 8.6-1: Stakeholder Meetings, and Table 8.6-2: Community Meetings, speakers bureau presentations and business briefings were provided to various public and special interest groups throughout the Transit Study and EIS Process.

8.6.2 Stakeholder Meetings

As indicated in Section 8.5: Central Corridor Committees, coordinating committees were formed to meet regularly and to provide policy direction and to assist the project team in decision-making and technical analyses. Every effort was made to incorporate other stakeholders into the decision-making process. Table 8.6-1, provides a listing of stakeholder meetings and presentations beyond those included in the regularly scheduled CCCC, PMT and WGT meetings.

8.7.1 Mailing list

The mailing list for the proposed Central Corridor project was initiated during the early stages of the Transit Study and updated throughout the Transit Study and EIS Process. Additional agencies, organizations, business groups, and individuals that attended project events and meetings, or those who specifically requested to be included on the mailing list, were added. The mailing list was used to notify participants of workshops, events and other activities, as well as to distribute flyers, newsletters and various other forms of information.

8.7.2 Project Website

The project website, www.centralcorridor.org provided the most current project information available. This interactive communications tool served the public with updated project-related information, alignment maps, meeting schedules, outreach efforts and public involvement opportunities.

8.7.3 Public Outreach Hotline

The RCRRA Project Manager, Steve Morris was featured in all news releases, articles, and any other publication related to the project. His phone number, (651) 266-2784, was listed to give individuals the opportunity to voice their concerns or ask specific questions about the proposed Central Corridor project. RCRRA monitored and responded to these concerns and questions and each of these were incorporated into the decision-making process.

8.7.4 Media Releases and Alerts

At the outset of the Central Corridor Transit Study, RCRRA developed a media relation strategy to define the processes for maintaining regular communication with major metro media and community news media throughout the Transit Study and EIS Process. The strategy included methods for responding to inquiries and strategies for generating on-going coverage of Central Corridor issues and events. Both graphic and narrative materials were developed to clearly communicate the process and findings of the Transit Study and EIS, including technical analysis, issues under consideration, the relative performance of the transit alternatives under consideration, and the choices and trade-off required in the decision-making process. The materials developed for release to the media were designed for easy understanding by the average



citizen, with the purpose of maintaining public awareness and fostering understanding of key issues in the proposed project development. All media contacts were coordinated through the RCRRA media consultant. Media relation materials and activities included:

- Media kits, including graphics, visuals, timelines, background information and contacts
- News releases and alerts for dissemination to the media

8.8 PUBLIC COMMENTS AND COORDINATION

A significant number of oral and written comments were received during the EIS Scoping Process. All comments from agencies, business groups, organizations and members of the public are documented in the Central Corridor *Scoping Summary Report*, under separate cover, as well as detailed information about activities, meetings and workshops held during the timeframe of the EIS Scoping Process.

In accordance with federal regulations, public hearings will be held as part of the NEPA process to disclose the potential effects of the alternatives under consideration to the public and to provide the public the opportunity to comment on the Draft EIS. The formal public hearings will be scheduled following the distribution of the Draft EIS, approximately two weeks after circulation of the document to the public. At the hearings, information to be presented will include the purpose and need for the project, description of the alternatives under evaluation assessment of social, economic, environmental and transportation impacts and potential mitigation measures. The public will be invited to comment on the information presented and the contents of the Draft EIS verbally or in writing. Responses to comments will be prepared and included in the Final EIS. The Final EIS will identify how comments received influenced the project outcome.

As indicated in Section 8.11, when this document is released for public comment, all comments received will be included as an appendix in the Final EIS.

8.9 PROJECT OFFICE

The project office for the proposed Central Corridor project is located at the RCRRA office located at 50 West Kellogg Boulevard, Suite 665, St. Paul, MN 55102.
