Background

Business item 2007-391, passed by the Council on December 12, 2007, authorized the publication of a Notice of Intent to prepare an SDEIS for the Central Corridor LRT project. The scope of the document was limited to disclosing changes from the Locally Preferred Alternative as documented in the April 2006 DEIS with a specific focus on key elements including the following issues:

- 1. Hiawatha / Central Connection
- 2. University of Minnesota alignment (tunnel vs. at-grade and stations)
- 3. Potential Added Station at: Western, Victoria or Hamline
- 4. Capitol Area Alignment/Station Modifications
- 5. Downtown St. Paul Alignment/Station Modifications
- 6. Right-of-Way for Systems Components traction power substations
- 7. Design for 2- or 3-Car Trains / Platforms
- 8. Maintenance and Storage Facility Needs

Subsequent to passage of this business item, the FTA required the addition of Washington Avenue Bridge modifications and/or improvements to the SDEIS. The SDEIS is now complete and has been approved for publication by the FTA with a scheduled publication date of July 11, 2008. Rationale

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Central Corridor report excludes parking solutions

Haven't had enough Central Corridor? There are 1,800 double-sided pages waiting for you at the local library or online. The document details the latest engineering plans for the 11-mile light-rail line connecting St. Paul and Minneapolis.

Intended to lend an engineer's eye to two years of policy and design changes, the Supplemental Draft Environmental Impact Statement addresses issues from additional stations in St. Paul to the transit mall agreement with the University of Minnesota.

But those looking for hard answers about parking along University Avenue and skyway access in downtown St. Paul will have to wait.

The report wasn't intended to address issues like parking, just "more major issues" like route alignment, though officials are still working to tackle those, Central Corridor LRT Project spokeswoman Laura Baenen said.

Issues addressed in the report include the potential of adding stations at Hamline and Western avenues and Victoria Street.

Still, Baenen called the parking lost as a result of the project "really a drop in the bucket" given the 20,000 offstreet parking spots on side streets.

"That's really been lost" in the debate, she said. "People aren't looking at that."

But for Ahvo Taipale, owner of Finn Sisu, a cross country ski supply store between Dewey Street and Fairview Avenue on University, parking is everything.

"It is very tough to find enough parking if all the parking on University is gone," he said. "Today's customer is not willing to walk that far."

For his business, Taipale said, most of his customers come from the suburbs, which means they expect to be able to park close by.

Taipale is not alone. A number of business owners along University Avenue have voiced concerns about parking shortages stemming from the project.

Another concern not addressed in the report is skyway access at Cedar and Fifth streets in downtown St. Paul. Plans call for demolition of a section of skyway that will separate the main system from skyways to City Hall and other buildings west of Cedar.

In a separate report, project planners said reducing University Avenue to one lane during construction would worsen traffic congestion in the area. Planners had looked into the issue at the request of City Council Member Russ Stark.

The entire impact statement is available online at central <u>corridor.org</u> and at some Minneapolis and St. Paul libraries. The public comment period ends Aug. 25, and officials have organized three public hearings, two in St. Paul and one in Minneapolis.

More customer parking, additional stations, wide sidewalks among requests

en-foot-wide sidewalks, convenient bus connections, ample bicycle parking near stations and the replacement of lost on-street parking are among 25 "outstanding issues" the St. Paul City Council has identified as the Metropolitan Council completes its preliminary designs for the Central Corridor light-rail transit line.

The plan for the 11-mile light-rail line between the downtowns of St. Paul and Minneapolis is now going through a municipal consent process. St. Paul, Minneapolis, Ramsey

and Hennepin counties, the Minnesota Department of Transportation and the University of Minnesota have all been asked to weigh in on the preliminary engineering plans and forward their comments to the Metropolitan Council.

The City Council and Ramsey County Board share many of the same

concerns about the project. Ramsey County commissioners are also concerned that their request to eventually extend the light-rail line to the Union Depot concourse, where a multimodal transit hub is envisioned, not get sidetracked.

City Council members Russ Stark and Melvin Carter III said the loss of on-street parking for businesses on University Avenue is one of their top concerns. A resolution adopted by the City Council on July 9 asks the Metropolitan Council "to work with the city and the county to assist in finding solutions and funding to help address this issue."

The inclusion of funding in the agreement is key because it isn't clear yet who will pay for additional off-street parking to make up for the estimated loss of 625 to 985 of the 1,150 on-street parking spaces on St. Paul's section of University. City officials have contended that the money should come out of the Met Council's \$892 million budget for the project.

Another priority for the city and county is to make sure that the infrastructure is in-

stalled for future light-rail transit stations at Hamline, Victoria and Western avenues, as promised by the Met Council, and that those stations are built sooner rather than later.

The City Council is asking that Metro Transit maintain the current level of service on the Route 16 bus along University. The Central Corridor plan currently calls for cuts in University Avenue bus service. According to Stark, that plan would seriously inconvenience people who are dependent on transit, especially considering the one-mile distance between most of the proposed light-rail stations on University. His colleagues on the City Council agree, and have called for a net gain in transit service along the Central Corridor

The City Council has also asked for "a thorough and fair comparison of the costs, ben-

efits and impacts" of maintaining the existing four traffic lanes on University or narrowing the street to two traffic lanes to provide for wider sidewalks once the light-rail tracks are in.

The City Council has asked Central Corridor engineers to work with District Energy St. Paul to minimize the impact of light-rail

construction on the downtown heating and cooling system, to work with the St. Paul Fire Department on maintaining access across the light-rail tracks for emergency vehicles, and to address any problems that might arise from train vibrations on the Church of St. Louis, Central Presbyterian Church and Minnesota Public Radio.

The Central Corridor project staff has promised to work with state and municipal officials on issues raised through the consent

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

Three public hearings set in August on Supplemental Draft Environmental Impact Statement

The Metropolitan Council will hold three public hearings in August on the Central Corridor LRT Supplemental Draft Environmental Impact Statement. The SDEIS discloses changes from the Draft Environmental Impact Statement and the impacts of those changes. After the hearings and a 45-day comment period that will end Aug. 25, the Met Council will take formal action Aug. 27 to revise the preferred alignment from the route identified in the DEIS. 
Regents OK agreement for Washington Avenue transit/pedestrian mall traffic mitigation

Regents for the University of Minnesota have approved a memorandum of understanding on \$27 million in traffic mitigation, including \$11.1 million for converting Washington Avenue into a transit/pedestrian mall. The MOU also includes \$5.1 million for East Bank campus area street connections and funding for modifying some intersections. In addition to Central Corridor project funding, the Metropolitan Council, Hennepin County, the Hennepin County Regional Railroad Authority, city of Minneapolis and university agreed to seek funding outside of the project costs for these betterments. "We're confident that with these mitigations and community betterments, this new light rail line will be a positive addition to our campus and the backbone of a modern regional transit system," University of Minnesota President Robert Bruininks said.

Preliminary design plans for Central Corridor unanimously approved

The cities of St. Paul and Minneapolis and the Ramsey and Hennepin county boards have unanimously approved preliminary design plans for the Central Corridor LRT Project. The plans show the location of track, roads, turn lanes, sidewalks, curbs and gutters, bus stops, crosswalks, proposed on-street parking spaces, traffic signals, station platforms and existing conditions. Also shown are the typical station platform types, layout of equipment on each and the electrical and communications components.

Reducing University Avenue to one lane each way would worsen traffic congestion


Traffic delays during the afternoon peak period would increase greatly and 10 intersections would fail if University Avenue is reduced from two lanes to one lane in each direction as part of the Central Corridor LRT Project, a study concluded. The Central Corridor LRT Project office conducted the study at the request of the city of St. Paul to see if there was a way to add bicycle lanes, increase sidewalk width or retain on-street parking and still keep vehicle traffic flowing well with the advent of light rail. The analysis found there would be significant vehicle back ups and delays at intersections by reducing University to one lane in each direction. The average travel speed for the afternoon peak hour would be 5 mph eastbound and 10 mph westbound, compared with the current 18 mph eastbound and 19 mph westbound. Besides 10 intersections failing, three others would drop in the afternoon peak hour to a level of service rating of E, which is marginally functional. A failure is when vehicles have to wait through more than one light cycle.

Familiar face returns to the Central Corridor LRT Project

Eve Vang, who was a community outreach intern in the summer of 2007, has rejoined the Central Corridor LRT Project as an associate outreach coordinator. Vang, a 2007 graduate of the College of St. Benedict, left last fall to spend six months in Thailand teaching English on a Fulbright scholarship. "The current routing is slow, eliminates the ability of the people in the neighborhood to use transit on University Avenue, eliminates parking and will create horrendous traffic jams at key intersections that are already overburdened."

"But one of the most fundamental questions going forward that everyone should be asking is what can we do to make sure the benefits of this investment are realized by the many diverse people often of very modest means who have called the area along Central Corridor home. There are so many potential ways to make sure those benefits are shared widely as we re-imagine the Central Corridor. But making sure the benefits are shared fairly will take creativity, collaboration, and persistence. And in those efforts, we all have a role we can play, if we wish to take it."

from Met Council documents The Central Corridor Light Rail Transit Project linking downtown St. Paul and downtown Minneapolis via Washington and University avenues would be the fourth in a planned network of rail and bus ``transitways'' in the Twin Cities. Construction would begin in 2010 on the planned 11-mile Central Corridor line, with service beginning in 2014. The line would connect with the Hiawatha LRT line at the Metrodome station in Minneapolis and the Northstar

commuter rail line, which will begin operation in late 2009, at the new Downtown Minneapolis multimodal station. The Metropolitan Council would be the grantee of federal funds. The regional government agency is charged with leading the design and building of the line in partnership with

A Supplemental Draft Environmental Impact Statement (SDEIS) for the Central Corridor light-rail transit project is available for public review through Aug. 25. An environmental impact statement is a comprehensive study and document intended to guide local decision-making on a wide range of impacts related to large development projects.

An earlier Alternatives Analysis/ Draft Environmental Impact Statement (AA/DEIS) for the Central Corridor was published in April 2006; the more recent SDEIS is to "inform the public, resource agencies and local governments of changes proposed to the project" since that time, and to published "refinements proposed and analyzed during preliminary engineering," according to the Central Corridor website.

The SDEIS offers a project summary, including proposed stations and key project elements, and it addresses the project's history; key changes and refinements; social, environmental and transportation issues; agency coordination and community outreach; and next steps and actions.

The public has an opportunity to comment on the SDEIS and "participate in the decision making process." An electronic version of the complete SDEIS (as well as a much shorter executive summary) is available online at www.centralcorridor.org. Copies are available for viewing at Hennepin County, St. Paul and Met Council libraries and at the Central Corridor offices in St. Paul.
