

- Preliminary Municipal Wastewater Charges (MWCs) sent mid-May to each of our 111 communities









Wastewater Outstanding Debt





May 2023C Bond Sale – AAA, \$90M, 20 year fixed, 3.4%


Projected Debt Service Change

Average retail sewer rates per household




Historical SAC Rate Increases (%)
